## GOOD ROADS MEETING IN LINCOLN

W. B. Banning Elected President and Convention Decides in Favor of Searis' Bill.

The good roads meeting at Lincoln yesterday was very well attended by parties from all sections of the state who are interested in the project, and this county was represented by T. H. Pollock of the Commercial club and County Commissioners C. R. Jordan of Alvo, C. E. Heebner of Nehawka and Julius Pilz of this city. There was much discussion over the different measures that are proposed to be enacted by the present session of the legislature, and at times the debate on the different bills grew decidedly warm.

The meeting went on record as favoring a bill proposed by S. A. Searis, which favors the creating of a state highway commission. The bill provides for a commission of six, including the governor, attorney-general, commissioner of public lands and buildings and three deputies, no more than two of whom can be members of the governor's political party. Besides superintendents will serve in each county, not as elected officers, but appointed. Under the bill plans and specifications for all bridge building in the state will be furnished free of charge by the commission's engineer. The bill also provided for compulsory road dragging.

The meeting, in their election of officers, certainly made a splendid choice for president in the person of Hon. W. B. Banning, who is one of the original good roads men in the state, and with him at the head of the association some mighty good results may be looked for from their work. Mr. Banning has devoted considerable time to the study of this question and is capable of handling the good roads proposition in any manner that may come up, and during the time he was in the legislature he was a strong worker in this cause. The good roads question in this day and age is one of the most vital that confronts the people and the work done to improve the roads is labor well placed.

### Death Near Union.

From Wednesday's Daily. The news was received here this morning of the death yesterday at his farm near Union of John Irwin, a life-long resident of that locality. Mr. Irwin was a man of about 50 years of age and was well known throughout this county. The death was quite sudden and no information could be secured as to the cause of it.
