

# NOT ANXIOUS TO RESUME WAR

Plenipotentiaries of Balkan States Debate Whether to Renew Hostilities at Once or Delay and Latter Policy Wins-Rumania Is Foared.

London, Jan. 27 .- The Balkan plenipotentiaries who have received full powers from their respective governments appointed a committee to draft a note to the Turkish plenipotentiaries explaining why the pence conference must now be considered broken off. It is hoped the draft will be ready for approval by the full delegation tonight.

This action of the aliles is part of a series of well considered forms of pressure with which the Balkan delegates hope to obtain their object without resuming the war.

The meeting lasted for an hour and a half and the course to be followed was given earnest consideration. Two distinct views were manifested-one for the immediate rupture of the negotiations leading to a resumption of the war and the other favoring a temporizing policy, in order to avoid irrevocable steps. The latter course triumphed and a committee was appointed, consisting of one member from each delegation.

General lines were laid down on which the note is to be drafted, comprising the arguments already set forth many times as to why the league demands the surrender of Adrianople and the Aegean islands as an indispensable condition to the conclusion of peace.
