

NOTICE OF PROPOSITION TO VOTE SPECIAL TAX.

The electors of the County of Cass, Nebraska, will meet at the County Jail on the 25th day of April, A. D. 1913, at the regular voting places in all the precincts and wards throughout said county, for the following question and proposition will be submitted to a vote of the people: Shall the Board of County Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska, or other person or persons charged by law with the appropriation of money and levying of taxes for said county for the time being, appropriate the sum of \$12,000 and, in addition to the regular annual taxes, cause to be levied on all taxable property of said county, a special tax sufficient to raise said amount for the purpose of building a County Jail on the Court House grounds in the City of Plattsmouth, Cass County, Nebraska, taking such action as the requirements of the law and the interests of the public may demand; provided that said special tax be levied at the time of making the regular levy of the general taxes for the year 1913, and be entered upon the tax list for that year and collected in the same manner as other taxes, and that proceedings shall be commenced for the erection of said jail as soon as the authority is obtained from the electors as is possible under the law, and be continued without unnecessary delay until the same shall have been completed and provided that said special tax be levied and collected one year and one year only.

That the said question and proposition above set forth shall be submitted to the legal voters of said county in the following form and manner: That is to say the form of the ballot to be used at said election in favor of said question and proposition shall be as follows: "I vote for the appropriation of \$12,000 and for the levy and collection of a special tax sufficient to raise said amount for the purpose of building a County Jail."

And the form of the ballot to be used at said election against said question and proposition shall be as follows: "I vote against the appropriation of the sum of \$12,000 and against the levy and collection of a special tax for the purpose of building a County Jail."

QUICK REVISION OF TARIFF IS PLANNED

Democratic Leaders Will Consult President Frequently.

Washington, March 20.—Quick tariff revision along lines acceptable to the Democratic leaders of both houses of congress was the object of a conference between the ranking tariff revisionists of the party in the senate and the house. The conference, marking the completion of the tariff revision bill in all essential particulars by the house ways and means committee, was designed as a move to get together on common ground and to smooth the ways for the launching of the first Democratic tariff in many years under a policy of swift, harmonious action.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina, chairman of the senate finance committee, and Senators Stone, John Sharp Williams and Smith of Georgia constituted the senate subcommittee for the conference with Chairman Underwood and some of his colleagues of the ways and means committee, the senators going to the house side in accordance with the tradition incident to the revenue-originating functions of the house.

House Democrats are confident they have framed a tariff measure that will be a faithful conformance to the party platform and satisfactory, generally, as a downward revision measure, and that the revision in one bill should be able to run the gamut of both houses without much scarring.

A conference later between Senators Simmons, Smith, Williams, Hughes and Chairman Underwood resulted in the understanding that tariff rates will be thoroughly considered jointly by the house and senate committees and President Wilson before the tariff revision actually begins in the house.

Mexicans Will Absorb Reduction.

El Paso, Tex., March 20.—Contracts already are being written by Mexican cattle raisers designed to absorb any decrease in tariff rates which the special session of congress may make in the cattle list, according to W. W. Bogel of Marfa, Tex., who is here attending the Texas Cattle Raisers' annual convention. Bogel said Mexican cattlemen are stipulating in their contracts for delivery that if the United States congress reduces the tariff the price paid them for cattle must be increased proportionately.

HOUSE OF DEATH DESTROYED

Place of Many Tragedies at Last is Burned.

Chicago, March 20.—The tragic existence of the "House of Death," at 253 Wentworth avenue, closed with its destruction by an incendiary fire, in which three lives were lost, Frank Pustella and his brother-in-law, Joseph Cavellieri, escaped with severe burns by jumping from a second story window, but Mrs. Pustella and her daughters, aged three and four years, were overcome by smoke as they reached a window and perished in the flames. The house gained its name because of the fatalities which have occurred within it during the last ten years.

Has His Toe Mashed.

Fred Philbrick, a bridge carpenter, employed by the Burlington at Ashland, was injured this morning by having a tie fall and mash one of his toes in a very severe manner, and he came to this city where the injured member was dressed and made as comfortable as possible, and he will enjoy a short vacation from his duties for a few days.
