### **DEPOSITS AND LOANS INCREASE IN NEBRASKA**

Lincoln, March 27.—Secretary Royse of the state banking board has issued a statement of the condition of the state banks at the close of business Feb. 15, 1913.

The report shows 698 banks, with 244,444 depositors. These depositors have within the banks individual deposits of \$43,716,883.35, demand certificates of \$7,372,219.32 and time certificates amounting to \$33,297,824.92.

The resources of the banks amount in full to \$107,686,929.88, an increase since March 16 of \$8,285,258.98. The posite have increased \$6,232,959.63 and the loans and discounts \$9,173,320.46.

The average reserve is 2614 per cent.

# DEAD IN PERU

Flood Makes Homeless Half Population of Indiana City.

### 150 PERSONS MAY BE DROWNED

Citizens Finding Lawlessness in Every Block Above Water Organize Vigilance Committee, With Orders to Shoot-7.500 Homeless.

Peru, Ind., March 27 .- Vivid details of the flood which devastated Peru. killing scores of its inhabitaous and making homeless more than half of cuers succeeded in propelling boats through the inundated streets. The

INVESTIGATES SALE OF STOCK Grand Jury Probes Complaints Against Independent Harvester Company.
