He advocated the crusade of the women against the saloons, and believed that they, with the aid of God, might do more for the cause of temperance than could be done by any other means. Rev. David Marquette next spoke in favor of the women's temperance move, and also in favor of women's rights. He seemed to think that it all depended on the women. The congregation now joined in singing "Only an Armor-bearer." After singing Rev. J. G. Presson addressed the meeting in favor of immediate organization of the women in this noble work. A live hog weighing 300 pounds will dress 257 pounds, and at 4 cents, makes \$10.28, a difference of 8 cents in favor of the dressed hog—and the lard pays for killing.

PERU NOTES.

During the summer session, 1913, of the Peru State Normal there were forty-five Cass county students registered.

The majority of the faculty at Peru are planning to attend the State Teachers' association. The board of education wishes all the teachers who can plan their work to attend the association.

This year the number of members in the graduate class reaches thirty. That number is an increase of twenty-three over last year. The graduate class is composed of those students who are planning to take two years in addition to the regular course. The degree of Bachelor of Education will be given those who finish this course.

Peru has adopted the budget system for all school functions. One ticket is sold for three dollars, which admits the bearer to four foot ball games, eight basket ball games, five base ball games, five lecture course numbers, band and orchestra concert, Glee club entertainment, one debate and also entitles him to a year's subscription to the Normalite, the official school paper. The total number of tickets sold was 659.

Bellevue and Peru meet each other in foot ball on the Peru athletic field Saturday, November 1. Coach Johnson is bringing the men up in shape and making the necessary shifts to bring out the best possible strength. Clarence Beal of Plattsmouth has been honored by having been elected captain of the team.

PLATTSMOUTH MEN DO NOT FARE WELL

The land drawing for the last government land in the state of Nebraska, which was held at North Platte yesterday, resulted in a number from this county drawing claims, although they were far down the list of prize-winners. There was a large number of persons from this city in the registration at Broken Bow, but the only successful one as reported in the papers this morning is John C. Linderman, who drew claim No. 485, Frank Read of Murray was a little more successful, getting No. 448. C. R. Jogley of Weeping Water secured No. 1,024, while Clarence G. Mayfield of Louisville was the winner of No. 1,105. There were 538 farms to be drawn in the land lottery and these last numbers are not worth much unless others fail to claim their farms. The list, consisting of some 75,000 names, which were not even drawn, was shipped to Washington to be filed in the general land office.

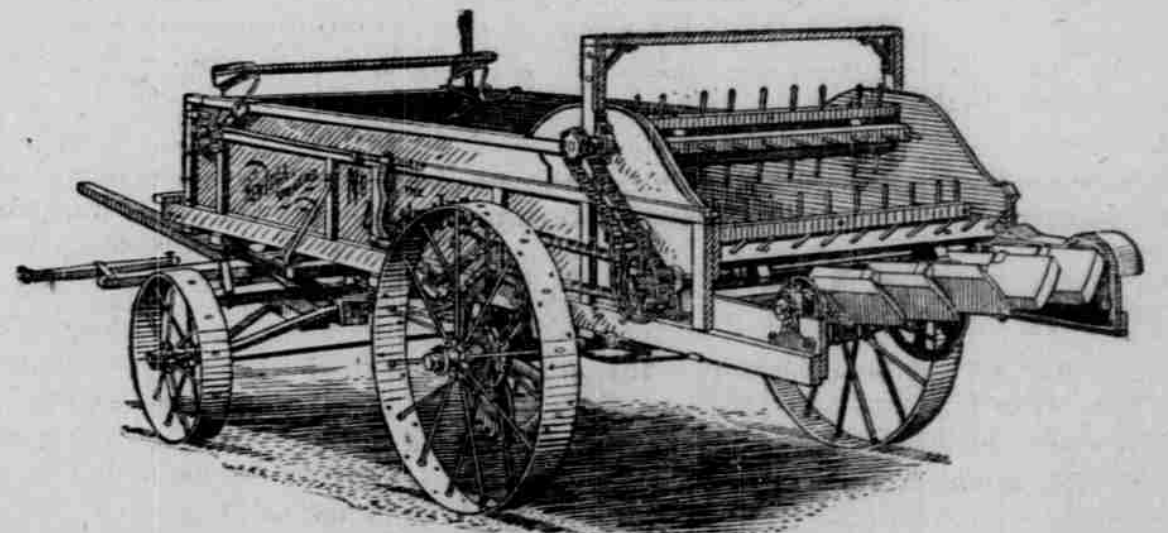
