The Northwest Post, printed at Belle Fourche, S. D., in commenting upon an article that appeared in the Journal, and written by Rev. F. M. Durliner, pastor of the Methodist church of this city, says:

A minister at Plattsmouth, Nebraska, advocates a discontinuance of the old-time custom of publicly "viewing the remains" of those who have passed to their reward. That strikes us as a most sensible idea. It is meet and proper that relatives and friends take their last farewell of their departed ones in the privacy of the home, but to publicly re-open the heart wounds again in a church crowded with curious people (as is usually the case), seems crude and barbaric, to say the least. Another step in the right direction would be the abolition of the old "Card of Thanks" custom. That always did appear to the Northwest Post as needless advertising on one's grief. The kind act of a friend when a home is visited by death is its own reward, and no one expects the bereaved family to publicly thank them for doing their plain, Christian duty. Give us "safe and sane" funerals as well as other celebrations.
