USEFUL HINTS.

To cut an iced cake without crumbling it, dip the knife for a few seconds in hot water.

To prevent suet from becoming sticky when chopping, sprinkle it with flour and chop it in a cold place.

When you spill hot grease upon the floor, immediately pour cold water upon it. This cools it before it can strike into the wood.
