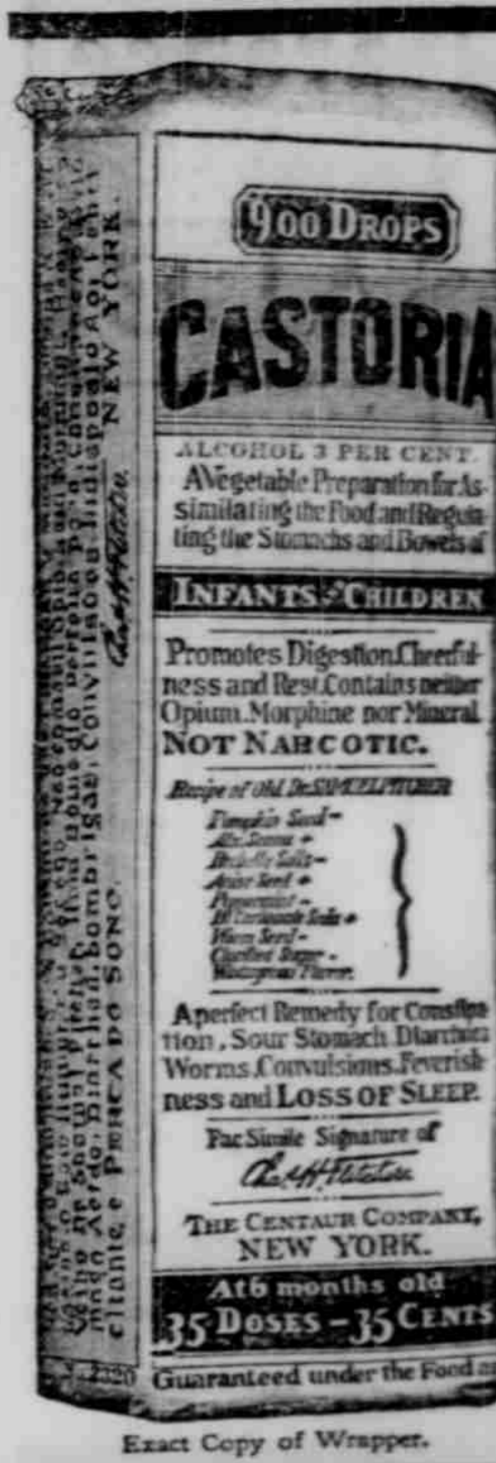

A Production of Rare Merit, and May Stewart is an Artist of Great Ability.

Last evening the amusement-loving public of the city was given a treat of rare merit in the production of "Lucrezia Borgia," at the Parmele theater by Miss May Stewart and company, and a more beautiful dramatic offering has not been seen in this city for some years, and the company were all of a very high standard and gave the tragic play of Victor Hugo in a very realistic manner. The story of Lucrezia Borgia is one of the most interesting and thrilling in the history of Italy, and the gifted pen of the great Frenchman has painted a wonderful play from the story of the beautiful and fascinating Italian woman, although in the play the character of the leading figure has been softened from the general conception gathered from the pages of history.

As Lucrezia, Miss Stewart displayed to its fullest the wonderful emotional talents she possesses, and she gave to the part a charming personality, and the appreciation of her splendid acting was demonstrated by everyone in the audience. Miss Stewart is most fortunate in selecting her company and in securing for her support as leading man Francis Thompson, as his interpretation of the role of Gennaro, a young soldier of fortune, was one of the cleverest and most realistic ever seen at the Parmele. Miss Marion Evenson gave a number of classic dances during the progress of the drama and her graceful and charming art won her a warm spot in the hearts of the audience, as her work in this line was

as good as can possibly be seen anywhere on the stage; she was assisted in the dances by Mr. Harry Memfield, a very pleasing and clever dancer. Paul Terhune, as the duke of Ferrara, was also very pleasing in his part as the evil-minded husband of the beautiful poisoner. The play was given a lovely setting by the producers, and this added greatly to the beauty of the play.

DOINGS IN THE DISTRICT COURT ON THURSDAY

The case of G. Lawrence Stull vs. the C. B. & Q. Railroad company has occupied the attention of the district court yesterday and today, and there has been a large number of witnesses examined on both sides of the case, which is a suit to recover damages caused, it is claimed by the plaintiff, of having several hay stacks set afire by sparks from a locomotive of the defendant company, and also for a calf killed by being struck by a train. The hay which was burned was located on the land of the plaintiff on the Platte bottom near Oreapolis, and the fires occurred during the year 1912 at different times, and a large amount of hay was lost through the fires. There was much interest shown in the case and the court room has been well filled at each session to hear the testimony of the different witnesses. Mr. Stull is represented by D. O. Dwyer, while Rawls & Robertson are acting as attorneys for the railroad company.
