WONDERFUL MECHANICAL DEVICE FOR KEEPING BOOKS

From Tuesday's Daily. One of the most wonderful mechanical devices that has ever been brought to this city is the Burroughs bookkeeping machine that has been installed in the First National bank, and the little machine makes the work of keeping the books an easy matter and will lessen the time required to post the day's business almost one-half. The machine makes a register on the leaves of the ledger of the old balance of the customer, the amounts of the various checks cashed against his account each day, the amounts deposited and the balance to his credit at the close of the day. The machine has one feature that is especially interesting, as it will, when the account of the customer is overdrawn, lock itself and it is necessary to release the lock before the overdrawn entry is made by the machine in the proper column of the ledger. The machine will be operated by an electric motor and very rapid work can be secured in keeping the accounts of the bank's customers straight, and anyone desiring to know how they stand can find out at any time by calling at the bank, as every account is kept right up to date and the canceled checks can be secured at any time without the least trouble. The machine cost some \$500, but is well worth the money, as it keeps a perfect and accurate account of the business of the bank.

BEN COX, OF OMAHA STARTS "ROUGH HOUSE" AT THE JAIL LAST NIGHT

From Tuesday's Daily. Last evening two men named Cox, who gave their residence as Omaha, were gathered into the jail for being found in a state of intoxication, one of the brothers, John Cox, being placed in jail by Sheriff Quinton, while the other one, Ben Cox, was taken in by Chief of Police Ben Rainey. John Cox was released this morning, as his wife came down from Omaha and agreed to take him back with her to the metropolis. He met with much difficulty last evening while on his spree, as he fell down with great violence on the street, with the result that the left side of his face was skinned up in bad shape and his left eye was discolored, and he bore the appearance of having been mixed up in a "rough house," and was in a very repentant mood when taken back to Omaha this morning on No. 15. The other brother made quite a disturbance at the jail last evening after he had been placed in that venerable building, and expressed his displeasure at his confinement by kicking out a number of window lights and making himself generally a nuisance, so that it was necessary to confine him in the cell in the jail where he could express his anger without doing any harm. This morning Cox was arraigned in police court and entered a plea of guilty to the charge of being drunk and creating a disturbance and received a little package of \$2 and costs, amounting to \$5, which he paid and was released from the jail, with a warning to be careful of his future actions. Yesterday was apparently what might be called "blue Monday" for the Cox family.

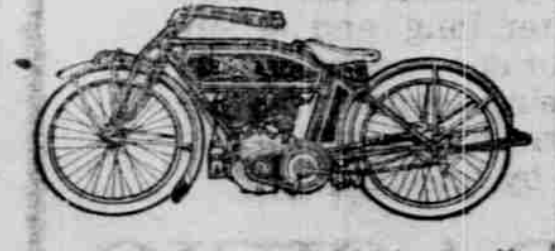
