New Institution Will Be Started Here as Soon as Arrangements Can Be Made.

Another new institution is about to be established in this city in the shape of a business college, which will be prepared to teach all the courses that can be found in any of the leading business colleges of the country, and in the interests of this proposition S. P. Randall of Bolton, Kansas, was in the city today making arrangements for the opening of the college, which will occur as soon as thirty pupils are secured for enrollment in the institution.

INTERESTING LETTER FROM MRS. L. A. MOORE FORMERLY OF THIS CITY

The following is a letter from Mrs. L. A. Moore, which will be of interest to their many friends in this city:
Stemper, Fla., Jan. 8, 1914.
Please find enclosed \$1.50 for renewal of Semi-Weekly Journal. We like to get the news from the old town and the old friends. We are perfectly delighted with the Florida climate and fruits and lakes and fish. My health is steadily growing better and I think I will soon be able to "burn stumps" with any of them. You see that is the regular pastime down here, as everyone is clearing land, and none stand back for style nor white hands if they are able to be outdoors; and you can, most every day, work outside in comfort and enjoyment. Our father is out now in shirt sleeves, boring a hole through the stumps that I claim the privilege of "firing." He says he has found the fountain of "Ponce-de-Leon" and is going to live to be 125 years old. But for my husband's sad affliction our little home among the pines and palm-trees would be quite happy. The recent operation on one eye has been partly successful, in that he can see enough to get about alone the last week, after being in total darkness for several weeks. We had no turkey on our table on Christmas, but we might have had if we had walked about three miles and been able to handle a gun. Game is quite plentiful around us. I did have on the table, however, from my own patch, sweet potatoes, sweet peppers, cucumbers, okra, cans-says (a good substitute for Irish potatoes) and strawberries and a beautiful bunch of roses. If my husband recovers his sight we expect to do well here, and if the Lord wills it otherwise, we will do the best we can and feel that we are in a genial climate and among genial people.
