The fact that the young man may recover the use of his arm will be most pleasing to his friends here, who have felt deeply his misfortune.

He thought at first that perhaps someone was responsible for the sudden deaths of the animals, but after the loss of the third horse he noticed from the position in which the animal was found that it was almost impossible for anyone to have been responsible, and he at once telephoned in to Dr. O. Sandin and reported the circumstances, as well as the shape the animals were in, and the doctor at once expressed the opinion that they were suffering from the cornstalk disease, which when it takes hold of the horse seems to make them crazy and causes them to run madly about and into any object that comes in their way and tearing themselves on fences or any object they may run across. Mr. Propst has removed the horses to his home at Mynard and reports them as doing all right now.

EVERETT WILES HAS ANOTHER ACCIDENT

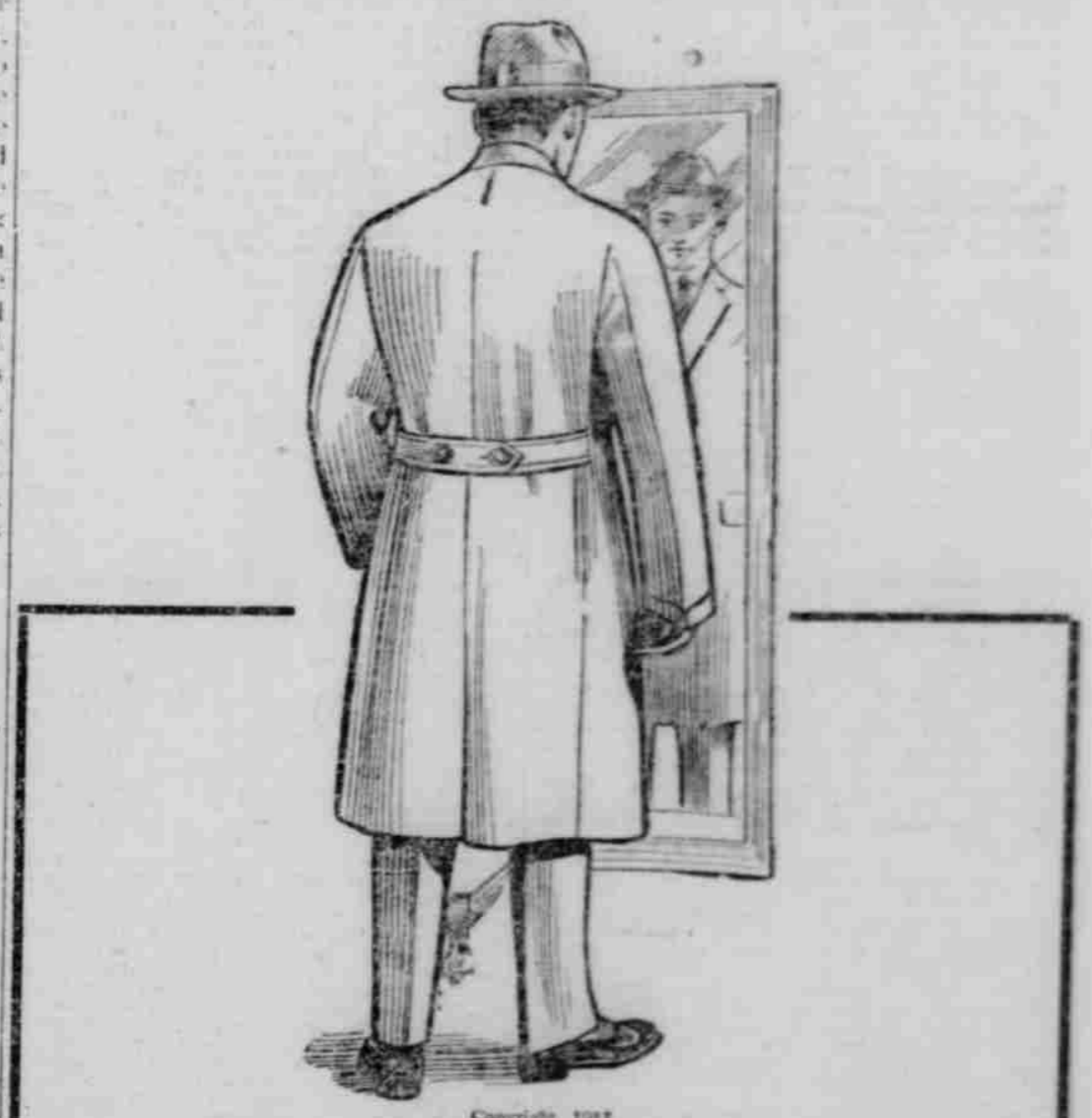

Everett Wiles, the young man who was injured in such a terrible manner in an automobile accident near this city on Thanksgiving day, which resulted in a fracture of his thigh is again in very serious shape, as the result of an accident at his home, which has resulted in his thigh being fractured for the second time. Mr. Wiles yesterday, for the first time since Thanksgiving, was able to leave his bed, and thought to try and use his lower limbs, and getting up from his bed attempted to stand with the aid of a chair, but the young man suddenly became faint and loosened his hold on the chair and fell, striking the bed as he went down, which resulted in the break in the bone being opened up again, and he was forced to have the limb set for the second time. It was thought necessary by the attending physician to remove the injured man to the hospital in Omaha, as an operation will be necessary to allow the bone to knit together in proper shape, and he was taken to that city this afternoon, where he will be placed in the hospital to remain until he has recovered from this second mishap.
