BURLINGTON PREPARING TO RESUME WORK ON THE RIPRAPPING

The Burlington is preparing to resume active work on the riprap across the river and to carry on the work of making the mat for the protection of the bank along the Iowa side of the Missouri river, and they desire the services of ten or twelve additional men, who will be taken to and from this city on handcars to the scene of operation, northwest of Pacific Junction. The men will work nine hours and be paid 17 1/2 cents per hour for their work. This, while not a high wage, will be found very acceptable to anyone out of employment and should there be anyone in need of work in this city they can secure a job by notifying the agent, Mr. Clement, at the depot.

BANK OF COMMERCE OF LOUISVILLE SUED BY ADVERTISING COMPANY

From Tuesday's Daily. Yesterday in Justice M. Archer's court, the case of the Ogult Advertising Company vs. the Bank of Commerce of Louisville was brought up for trial. This case was brought to collect \$101, which the plaintiff claimed was due on a contract for advertising cuts and service which they claimed the defendant had entered into with them. The defendant bank, through its president, Mr. T. E. Parmele, showed that the agent of the plaintiff came to Louisville and attempted to interest Mr. Parmele in the proposition, but that he had declined to accept the offer to buy service and started to drive off in his automobile when the agent for the company went into the bank and told the cashier that Mr. Parmele had said for him to sign the contract. When the cuts arrived later they were sent back and the company started suit. The court found for the defendant and the advertising company will have to stand the costs in the case. Mr. Parmele and the bank were represented in the case by Rawls & Robertson of this city, and the firm is feeling well pleased over the outcome of the case, which clearly showed that the agent for the company had attempted to put one over on the bank.

Extravagant Ball Arranged as Protest Again Movement to Help Working Women.

At Newport Mrs. Stayvesant Fish gave a ball. Twelve million dollars' worth of gems were worn. The costumes, not useful for future wear, cost sixty thousand dollars. Mother Goose characters were represented. The hostess says she arranged for the ball "as a protest against the woman who wants the ballot, instead of those things she was created for." It is peculiarly appropriate that the people who do no useful work, who divide their time between loafing, drinking and scandals, should set themselves as leaders against suffrage, says the Franklin (Pa.) News. The votes-for-women movement is a phase of the labor question, and being for the benefit of working women and men who provide the wealth which Newport spends, is naturally opposed by those who spend without toil and waste without virtue. The people who gathered to make a Mother Goose party costing enough to save the lives of a thousand neglected children of the crowded tenements were largely women of the "Fifth avenue" type to whom home means living in five different houses. It is to be expected that they should set themselves to oppose the advance of humanity through increased power for the common people. Lacking intelligence to oppose effectively the improvement in conditions which will finally make human parasites impossible, they well illustrate, by their silly extravagance and shallow-brained trifling, the element against which the sensible, motherly and efficient motherhood of the country is working.
