"LITTLE WOMEN" TO BE AT THE PARMELE SOON

What One of Our Lady Residents Who Had Seen the Play Says of It.

That William A. Brady's production of "Little Women" is one of the finest plays that she has witnessed is the enthusiastic statement of Mrs. George Dovey. This expression of opinion by one of Plattsburgh's leading residents, is both interesting and timely, for the reason that the play is booked for the Parmele theater and will be presented

"Little Women" is Louisa M. Alcott's story of forty years ago, told in a clean, fresh drama of today. The stage equipment and costumes are delightfully old-fashioned, depicting New England home life in the early 60's.

L. G. SHARP LEASES GASOLINE ENGINE FACTORY BUILDING FOR 5 YEARS

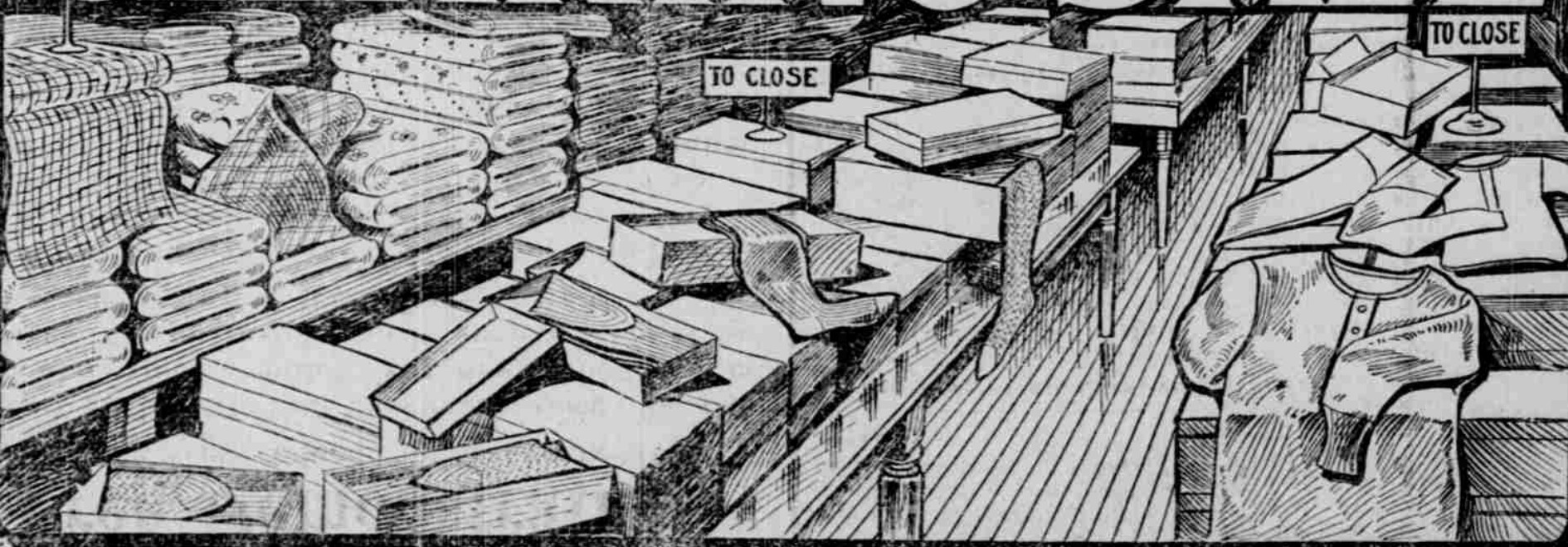
