THE PASSING OF MRS. HATTIE R. ALLISON

(From the Union Ledger). Born September 11, 1847, at North Baltimore, Ohio, Died at 6 o'clock Thursday morning, February 19, 1914, at their home, six miles northeast of Union, Neb., aged 66 years, 5 months and 8 days.

The sudden and unexpected leath of this estimable lady cast a gloom over the entire community in which she lived, and few knew that she had been very seriously ill. A short time before her death she had enjoyed her usual good health, and her death, coming so suddenly, was a great shock to the relatives and friends. She was called upon to mourn the death of ber mother, the late Mrs. Gertrude M. Wiley. and it was while attending the funeral on February 10, that Mrs. Allison took a severe gold that later developed into pneumonia and finally resulted in her death at the time above mentioned. The funeral services were held in the Lewiston church last Friday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, attended by a very large number of friends and relatives, the services being conducted by Rev. W. A. Taylor of this place, who preached a very impressive sermon from Revelations 14-13. Interment was made in the cemetery adjoining the church, the pall bearers being Fred Clark, L. J. Hall, Frank Rhoden, John Chappell, Creed Harris and John Hobschiedt.


