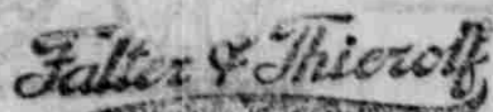

THE SNOW FALL A BLESSING TO THE TILLERS OF THE SOIL

The snowfall which visited this city yesterday afternoon and last evening is fast disappearing beneath the warming influences of the sun and a few hours as warm as this morning will take away the supply of the beautiful snow. The snowfall was quite generous while it lasted, there being something like four inches reported last evening in this city, but the weather was very warm and comfortable. The reports from the western and northern parts of the state indicate that the snowfall in that section was considerably heavier than here and was accompanied by a biting cold wind that swept over the sand hills with all the vigor of an old-time blizzard, but here in the eastern part of the state we were more fortunate in this respect and did not suffer to any extent from the storm. The rain of a few days ago and the snow of yesterday will furnish a great deal of moisture that will be of great benefit to the farmers in this section and greatly aid the betterment of the conditions of the soil and the crop of winter wheat, of which there is a great deal in the county.

ANOTHER DEATH AT THE MASONIC HOME TODAY

Alfred A. Cary, 88 Years of Age, Passed Away This Morning at an Early Hour.

From Tuesday's Daily. At an early hour this morning Alfred A. Cary, one of the aged gentlemen living at the Masonic Home in this city, passed away from old age, having lived 88 years, during the last few of which he has been quite feeble, but for one of his age was quite bright mentally.

He was born November 22, 1826, and during his long life had been a most useful citizen and his lifetime was filled with an effort to aid his fellow man as best he could. Mr. Cary was a member of Solomon lodge No. 10, A. F. and A. M., of Fort Calhoun, Neb., which he joined at an early day, and he came to this city November 25, 1905, and has since made his home here at the Masonic Home, where he had greatly endeared himself to the members of the Home. He was a very devout Christian and always was an earnest laborer in the cause of what he believed to be right, and his death will leave a place hard to fill among those who knew him best.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at the Home, and the body will be shipped to Freeport, Illinois, the old home of the departed, where it will be laid to its final rest, being sent to Omaha on the 1:58 Burlington train and from there shipped over the Illinois Central. He leaves no immediate family.

OUTBREAK OF SMALLPOX IS REPORTED SOME THREE MILES NORTH OF MURDOCK

The western part of the county is reported to be suffering from an outbreak of the smallpox, as two cases have been reported to the county clerk's office in the family of William Wilkins, who resides some three miles northwest of Murdock. The sheriff will be sent out there this afternoon to quarantine the place and see that the disease is not spread. Just how severe the cases were was not reported to the authorities, but it is not thought that they are of a particularly severe type. There cannot be too much care exercised in cases of this kind and the residents of the locality where the disease is reported from should take steps to see that there is no violation of the quarantine regulations that might endanger the safety of the residents of that section.

RULES TO BE FOLLOWED BY AUTO DRIVERS

The near approach of the spring season has brought out an increase in the number of automobiles that are being driven on the streets of the city and on the country roads and it is fitting that the rules laid down governing the use of the public highways be observed by the drivers of the different machines. The American Automobile association has approved of the following rules that are recommended for the guidance of the drivers of all automobiles and cars:

- Rules for auto drivers: Vehicles shall keep to the right hand side of the road. All vehicles overtaking others, shall, in passing, keep to the left of the center of the road and shall not pull over to the right of the road until entirely clear of the vehicle passed. Vehicles meeting each other shall pass each other to the right of the center of the road. All vehicles turning to the right into another road shall turn the corner as near the curb as practicable. All vehicles turning to the left into another road shall pass to the right of and beyond the center of the intersecting road before turning. All vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other shall do so by turning to the left so as to go in the same direction as the traffic on each side of the street.

Commissioners View Bridges. From Wednesday's Daily. The county commissioners this morning drove out into the country to inspect the bridges that have been placed there and also to see what repairs may be deemed necessary. They certainly struck a poor day for the venture, as the cold, biting wind and snowfall made the traveling very disagreeable, but the commissioners stuck to the job and visited a number of the bridges in this section of the county.
