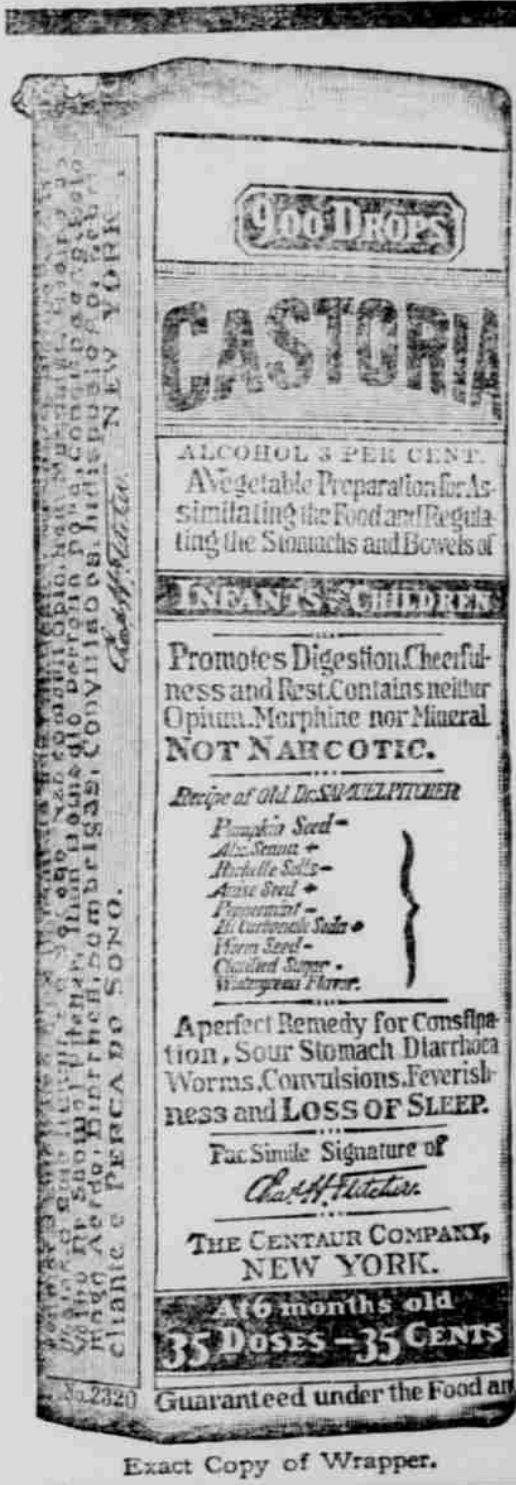

Many Fishers Drown in Constance.

Friedrichshafen, Germany, June 25.--The bodies of ten fishermen were recovered from Lake Constance and at least twenty-five more are missing, believed to have been drowned in a sudden storm, which broke over this region. The storm came so quickly that the fishermen were unable to reach land, only a mile or so away. Many were rescued by lake steamers and other craft after their light boats had capsized.

Strike of Paris Mail Carriers Ends.

Paris, June 25.--The letter carriers' strike, which had threatened to result in scenes of violence and had struck a severe blow at business, was brought to an end by a promise from Gaston Thomson, minister of posts and telegraphs, to make a searching inquiry into the men's grievances provided they returned immediately to duty.

Stays in Air Eighteen Hours.

Johannisthal, Germany, June 25.--A world's record for a duration flight was made at the aerodrome here by Gustav Basser. He remained in the air for eighteen hours and ten minutes without making a landing. The best previous record was made by Bruno Langner on Feb. 3, an uninterrupted flight lasting fourteen hours and seven minutes.
