THE "CUT OUT" NUISANCE SHOULD CEASE AT ONCE

Not Particularly Necessary, but It is an Annoyance to People and Should Be Stopped.

It has been quite noticeable of late that a great many of the drivers of automobiles, while running their cars on the street, will almost invariably run with the "cutout" on the muffler of their engines open, making a great deal more noise than is necessary and furnishing an annoyance to persons on the sidewalks or in stores who are trying to carry on a conversation at the time the machines pass them. While the use of the cutout does not in any way endanger the lives of anyone, at the same time it is not necessary and is purely optional with the driver of a car whether it is used or not.

The city has had an ordinance for some time that provided against this, and the drivers of cars should be more careful in using it when on the streets of the city. On the more thickly settled resident streets the cars going past late at night with "cutouts" open furnish the means of disturbing the slumbers of the peaceful citizens, and in case someone is sick the noise is very nerve-racking to the patient.

The use of this device is wholly unnecessary, as the amount of power that is developed by them is so small that it adds practically nothing to the running of the automobile, and with the "cutout" closed the general public is saved much annoyance. The motorcycles are even greater evils than the automobiles in this way, as their noise is at times something fierce and for blocks the loud reports from open mufflers can be heard, disturbing and annoying all within the radius of two or three blocks. These are small matters and a little thoughtfulness on the part of the drivers of the machines would make it far more pleasant for the persons on the streets here.


