

PIONEER RESIDENT OF PLATTSMOUTH PASSES AWAY

G. M. Patton, a Veteran in the Employ of the Burlington, Dies at His Home Last Evening.

From Tuesday's Daily. Last evening as the shades of night fell over the city, another of the old pioneer residents of Plattsmouth joined the ranks of the countless thousands who have taken up their journey on the unseen road, as the death messenger claimed the spirit of G. M. Patton, who since 1868 has been a resident of this city.

Mr. Patton was one of the veteran employes of the Burlington railroad in this city, having entered the service of that company some thirty-three years ago, and during all these years had been a faithful and trusted employe until the progress of his malady made it necessary for him to abandon his duties and since that time he had lived quietly at home, awaiting the summons of the Master from his suffering and sickness.

The death of this kindly old gentleman, who had passed his seventy-fifth birthday last April, will cause a feeling of deep regret among the many friends with whom he had been associated during his long residence here, and his place will be hard to fill in the hearts of those who knew him best, and to the bereaved wife, children and brother and sisters the deepest sympathy of the community will be extended in their loss, but they will have the memory of his long and useful life to sustain them in their hour of grief and sorrow.

PRIMARY ELECTION RETURNS INCOMPLETE

Governor Morehead Carries the County by 300, Libershal Has Good Majority, also Wundelich for Sheriff.

The long and complicated ballots at the primary election yesterday made the count a most difficult one for the judges and clerks of election in the different precincts of the county, and the returns were very slow in coming in to the office of the county clerk. On the democratic ticket in all precincts of the county so far reported Governor Morehead has a large lead over George W. Berge, his leading opponent, and will have between three and four hundred majority in the county.

Miss Mary Foster was the winner in the race for county superintendent by some 236 over J. H. Stothover of Elmwood, receiving 694 votes to 458 for her opponent. In the race for county commissioner in the third district Henry Snoko of Eagle has apparently succeeded in securing the nomination as he now has 175 votes to 118 for his nearest opponent, C. R. Jordan of Alvo, the present incumbent of the office.

Republican Results in County.

On the republican ticket the chief interest centered in the race for congressman and Matthew Gering of this city will have 300 majority in the county for the office. In this city he swept the slate clean receiving 167 votes while his opponents were unable to muster over 40 votes between them. Reports from out in the district appear quite favorable to Mr. Gering as he is running strong in every county and his nomination seems quite likely.

Seems to Look Like Revis. Lincoln, Neb., 2:45 P. M.

Special to the Evening Journal.—Reports from the First congressional district on the republican vote for congressman are coming in quite slowly and the exact figures on the result cannot be told at this time. A report from Falls City states that C. F. Revis carried Richardson county by 1,100, which, if true, would probably give him the nomination.

Later Returns.

The result of the primary election in this county remains about the same as stated in the Journal yesterday, and the fact that several precinct officials neglected to bring in a statement of the vote east there it will be necessary to await the finding of the canvassing board for the full vote of the county. On the democratic ticket Congressman Maguire received the largest majority, 622, receiving 873 votes and W. B. Price 251, with three precincts missing.

For the office of state representative M. G. Kime received 450, J. J. Gustin 388 and H. V. McDonald 218, which gives the plurality of Kime at 62, but this will probably be changed by later results. In the race for county clerk, Frank J. Libershal has won by a handsome majority of 237, having received 742 votes to 505 for B. G. Wurl, his opponent.

Republican Results.

In the republican contest for governor, with five precincts out, Howell leads the race, having 239 votes to 193 for Hammond and 118 for Kemp, while a small scattering vote was given the remainder of the candidates for the office. J. M. Teegarden of Weeping Water, candidate for state treasurer, received a very pleasing vote here in his home county, getting 521, while Hamer was only able to muster 95.

ber of democratic votes, as did also C. S. Aldrich of Elmwood, but as to who received a majority of the democratic votes it remains to be disclosed by the official canvass.

Both County Treasurer Fox and Major Hall, the candidates on the democratic and republican tickets for county treasurer, had no opposition and rested easy during the primary, and in the same boat were A. J. Snyder and Mont Robb, the candidates for register of deeds.

All reports on the republican congressional fight points to the nomination of C. F. Reavis of Falls City as the republican candidate for that position at the November election, although the report as to his having received 1,100 majority in Richardson county appears to have been unfounded.
