

# RED SOX GOT IT IN THE NECK AGAIN SUNDAY

The Black Kats of Omaha Take Their Scalp by Poor Playing of the Red Sox.

The opening of the base ball games with the Black Kats of Omaha on Sunday proved a most disastrous one for the Red Sox of this city who were put out of the running in the first inning of the contest when four tallies were registered at the plate for the visitors as the result of the efforts of the mighty Probst combination, and had Vernon not been able to strike two of the visitors out in this inning they might yet be playing as they were certainly going after the goat of the locals in an unmerciful manner. The locals were handicapped by the fact that a number of the regular members of the team were absent and this served greatly to interfere with the success of the Sox. Vernon pitched a good game and scored twelve strike outs on the Kats-Alamito combination which saved the defeat from becoming a rout. In the opening act of the little drama Lehr struck out, W. Probst was walked through the kindness of the umpire, B. Probst hit to short and in the attempt to catch W. Probst at second both were safe; G. Probst hit a long drive to left field that brought W. Probst over the plate with a score Guinane, who followed again was able to locate a safe spot in the left garden where he placed the ball that scored two more of the Kats; Rathke, the slab artist of the visitors was whiffed by Vernon but Lytell who followed piled on the agony with another hit along the third base line that brought Guinane over the plate. Lytell ended the inning by being tagged at second base. The visitors were able to annex another score in the first of the second when Overman walked; Suley hit to first base and Overman was retired at bak 2 on his way to the plate; Lehr struck out on the slants of Vernon, but W. Probst the fast short stop of the visitors was unable to rap one on the nose with result that another score was added to the large and rapidly growing list of the visitors. Azain in the fifth the Kats got in their heavy stick work with the result that two more runs were chalked up for them, B. Probst hit to short and was safe on an error and was advanced on the liner of G. Probst to center field; E. Probst came home on the hit of Guinane and Lytell brought G. Probst over the wire with the seventh score of the game.

The lonely little tally off the locals was harvested in the fourth inning when they succeeded in getting Craig over the plate for a run, when after the runner had reached first on a hit to short stop that was not handled in time and he reached the initial station in safety. Finder sacrificed nicely and advanced the runner and the score was made on the hit of Linton to right field.

At no stage of the game did the Red Sox appear dangerous contenders and the only redeeming feature of the contest was the work of the battery, Vernon and Herold, as both, of these gentle men were right on the job and the excellent work of Vernon was backed up by the handling of his delivery by Herold. Eleven men were struck out by Vernon.

## Elect New Directors.

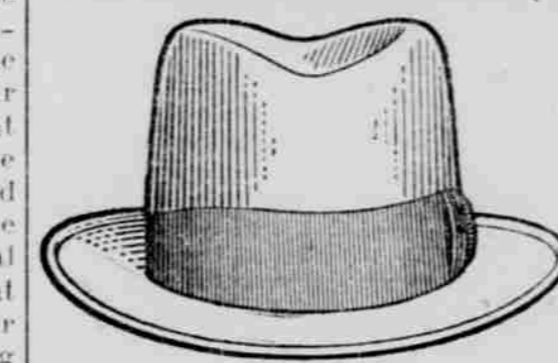
