

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT SOUTHEAST OF UNION

Gas Plant Explodes Seriously if Not Fatally Injuring George Everett and Brother John.

Union, Neb., Sept. 28.—(Special to the Journal).—Yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock, an accident that came near resulting fatally for George Everett, a prominent resident of this locality, occurred at his farm home, three miles southeast of this place when the gas plant used to furnish light for his home, blew up with the result that was most terrible to Mr. Everett and his brother, John Everett, of Avoca, who were working on the plant at the time of the explosion. The plant, which is located a short distance north of the house, had not been working very satisfactory and the two gentlemen had opened the place where the plant was to try and adjust it, and had just covered up the plant when the explosion occurred. Mr. Everett was hurled several feet away striking a fence and sustained a broken hip as well as having his left leg broken, and receiving several injuries about the face and head. John Everett was also severely burned but not as seriously as his brother and is now able to be around. Drs. G. H. Gilmore of Murray, Huston of Union and Wilson, of Nebraska, were summoned to the home of Mr. Everett to assist in caring for him and in dressing his injuries, but at an early hour this morning it was difficult to predict the outcome of the accident, owing to the terrible manner in which the unfortunate man had been injured. The news of the accident came as a great shock to the friends and neighbors of Mr. Everett and every thing possible is being done to aid in caring for him. Leslie Everett, a son, who is teaching in Oloo county, and Claudius Everett, a brother, residing at Nebraska City, were called and are at the Everett home to await the outcome of the injuries. The plant is a new one, having been installed only about a year ago when the new residence of Mr. Everett was completed, and heretofore has always given perfect satisfaction.

TEUTONS BURN BELGIAN TOWN

Germans in Revenge Apply Torch to Village of Bilzen.

Amsterdam, Sept. 28.—The Maast-richt correspondent of the Nieuws Van Den Dag has sent the following dispatch:

"Belgian soldiers blew up the railway at Bilzen, near Hasselt. Shortly afterwards a German military train was derailed and destroyed. In revenge the Germans burned the village. One hundred and fifty refugees arrived here from Bilzen."

"At Brussels the garrison continues actively to perfect the defense works. A complete belt of barbed wire now encircles the city, within which is a double line of trenches. It is also stated that all the high roads leading into Brussels have been mined."

SEVERELY INJURED BY HORSE RUNNING AWAY

Quite a serious accident occurred Saturday afternoon in a runaway on the Mynard road just south of the C. L. Jean farm in which Mrs. C. F. Vallery received several injuries and was knocked unconscious for several minutes. She was on her way home and was driving a horse that for several years she has been accustomed to using, but as she passed the Jean school house the animal shied and started to run away and was soon beyond the control of Mrs. Vallery and the animal started west on the Mynard road. Miss Marie Kauffmann and a party were returning to Plattsmouth from Mynard and seeing the runaway coming quite a distance away ran their car onto the side of the road where the weeds were quite high to prevent a collision with the oncoming buggy, and in doing so ran into a ditch that was concealed by the weeds and bent the axle rod of the automobile. The running horse passed the auto and when a few feet west, Mrs. Vallery was thrown from the buggy onto the roadway with the result that several gashes were cut on her forehead, and she was rendered unconscious for quite a little time. Miss Alpha Peterson who was in the auto partly ran to her side and the members of the party rendered what assistance possible but were much alarmed as the lady was apparently lifeless and it was with difficulty that she was revived from her unconsciousness and was then taken to the home of Mr. Jean where medical assistance was summoned and the lady's injuries dressed and she was then conveyed to her home.

DEATH OF MRS. ADALINE FELLERS, A WELL-KNOWN AGED LADY

On Saturday September 28th at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. L. Huffer near this city, Mrs. Adaline Fellers, an aged and highly respected resident of this county passed away after a lingering illness due to diabetes. RALLY DAY AT METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

The Greatest Sunday School Attendance in the History of Methodist Church Here.

The bicycle corps of boys who were engaged in delivering the invitations to the Rally day services of the Methodist church yesterday certainly did their work well as the gathering was one of the greatest every seen in the church both in the point of attendance and enthusiasm. Old and new members vied with each other in the enthusiasm shown in the meeting and the occasion will long be a notable event in the church history.

The auditorium of the church was very tastefully decorated by a committee of young ladies headed by Misses Marion Manzy and Elizabeth Beeson, with autumn branches and leaves and made a scene of exceptional beauty. The altar rail was covered with white over which sprays of leaves and the berries of the forest had been placed while the pulpit was moved back to the second landing of the platform and draped with a large American flag. Across the arch of the altar was strung the words Rally Day which were cut out of letters which were covered with moss and scarlet blooms adding a finishing touch to the artisticness of the decorations. The program which was under the direction of Mrs. Ferris York Jehinek was given in a most pleasing manner by the pupils of the school and consisted a number of songs and exercises by the members of the school, chief among which was the singing of "America" by the entire school which was certainly stirring in the extreme and furnished a splendid lesson in patriotism. The different classes were called in order on the roll call and entering took their places where the lessons of the day were taken up. One of the pleasing features of the occasion was the large attendance of the adult members of the school as the business men's class of A. L. Tidd, the Bible class of E. H. The rally day marks a step forward in this splendid organization that is possessed by few others in the city and the greatest of enthusiasm is shown by both the teachers and pupils in advancing the work.

GETS ROAD CLOSED ON ACCOUNT OF DANGEROUS CONDITION

The road south of this city east of the Horning farm has gotten in such shape that it has become necessary to close it on account of the fact that a large ditch that has been gradually widening there has finally made the road dangerous for travel, and it has been closed to all travel. The ditch is some thirty-four feet deep and about three hundred feet wide, and is an extremely dangerous one and one that has baffled all efforts to fix it.

The soil is of such a nature that it cracks easily and these cracks have led to the dirt caving off until the ditch is now beyond all fixing. The assistant state engineer has been here to look after the trouble, but was unable to suggest any method of handling it, and the matter will have to be wrestled with by the local authorities.
