

MOSLEMS NOT WITH TURKEY Aga Kahn Says Sultan Has Lost Job

as Trustee For Islam. London, Nov. 5 .- Aga Khan, who ! known as the spiritual head of the Mo hammedans in India, east Africa and central Asia, has sent a cablegran: from London, addressed to the Mos lems in India and other British domin ions, in which he expresses his dee sorrow that Turkey has joined hand: with Germany in the war.

In this message Aga Khan says: "This is not the free will of the sul tan, but the will of the German of ers and other non-Moslems, who have orced him to do their bidding."

He declares further that Turkey has now lost its position as the trustee o Islam. It has drawn its sword in ar unholy cause and the duty of the Mos lem today is to remain loyal and faith ful to their temporal and secular alle

CANADIANS ARE SCARED

In Pacific Dominion.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 5 .- The presence of five German warships in the Pacific off the coast of Chile, and the probability that two more, the Dresden and Emden, are on their way to join them, created considerable apprehension here for the safety of Canadian cities on the Pacific coast. To meet the sit uation the naval authorities at Ottawa were in conference all forencon. Measures of some sort, it is said, will likely be taken.

The fact that the German warships had been gathered into one fleet was taken here as a clear indication that Germany had perfected arrangements for coaling the fleet, and it was felt that little could be done to round up this fleet until British and Japanese

It is feared that the German flee may steam north and under threat of long distance bombardment attempt to levy tribute on the city of Victoria. The only danger to which the flect would be subject in carrying out such an enterprise, it is pointed out, would be an attack from the two submarines which Canada brought from Chile at the opening of the war and which are Hannibat, one of the greatest soldiers stationed in the waters about Van

Pipefish.

The pipelish take care of their young in a manner that is entirely peculiar. The newly laid eggs are taken care of by the male, which has a sort of fold on each side of its body. Beneath the "flaps" he keeps the eggs until the young are hatched and sufficiently grown to take care of themselves While in the "flap" they are fed by the mother, upon whom falls the duty of foraging around for food.


