

HUMAN HEALTH AND THE FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE

The Danger of Contaminated Milk Spreading the Disease Overcome by Quarantine and Pasteurization.

The anxiety that has been expressed in several quarters in regard to the effect upon human health of the present outbreak of the foot-and-mouth disease is somewhat exaggerated. The most common fear is that the milk supply might become contaminated...

It has been demonstrated by experiments which have been made in Denmark and Germany that pasteurization will serve as a safeguard against contagion from the foot-and-mouth disease just as readily as it does against typhoid fever...

In this country the foot-and-mouth disease has been so rare that there are few recorded cases of its communication to human beings. In 1902 a few cases were reported in New England...

Persons affected with the malignant form of the disease lose practically all of their milk. In mild cases, however, the decrease may be from one-third to one-half of the usual yield.

Men who come in contact with diseased animals may also become infected. In adult human beings the contagion causes such symptoms as sore mouth, painful swallowing, fever, and occasional eruptions on the hands, fingers, toes, etc.

menace to their own and their neighbors' property. The disease, in short, is dangerous because of the loss that it occasions to property, and not because of its effects upon the health of mankind.

Those who wish additional precautions are recommended to use pasteurized milk, but as has already been said, this recommendation holds true whether or not there is any fear of the foot-and-mouth disease.

WHAT IT COSTS TO RUN FOR OFFICE IN CASS COUNTY

Some Candidates Get Through the Campaign a Great Deal Cheaper Than Others Will Be Noted.

It has been stated frequently that the "high cost of living" was one of the chief worries of mankind, but from the statements filed by the candidates of the different offices at the late election it would seem that the high cost of campaigning was also one of the chief problems that arise upon the politicians during the ante-election periods.

It cost John Matras, Jr., the successful democratic candidate for state senator, \$142 to win in Otter and Cass counties, while Andrew Storm, the republican candidate, was relieved of \$149 in his campaign. These, like the other assessments, include of course the assessments levied on the candidates.

County Clerk Liberski, in his race for reelection, expended some \$28,550 including his assessment of \$50 to the county committee, while his republican opponent paid by the sum of \$7,728 to get the count.

In the race for county commissioner in the Second district the candidates were not very lavish in their expenditures, but were more forthcoming in their assessment to the county committee. Charles H. Spohn gave \$26,478 in his fight against Commissioner H. Ober, who expended \$83 in the race which he won by a vote of 1,000 to 200.

Major A. Hall, republican candidate for county treasurer, expended \$28,229 doing the campaigning, while Treasurer Fox has not yet filed his statement of the expenditure in his behalf.

Mike Riewer, just elected by a narrow margin from the Fourth district, had only to give \$27 in order to win out. His opponent had filed no statement so far as to his expense.

Henry Smith, from the Third congressional district, who was just elected, was taxed some \$74,775 in some under the wise judgment of Mr. Gilbert, his opponent, has no statement as yet on file.

In the race for register of deeds it cost A. J. Snyder \$90 to win, and Mont Riffe, his republican opponent, the sum of \$97 to get into the race. John Wandschell, the successful republican candidate for sheriff, paid out the sum of \$61,560 including his assessment, while Sheriff Quinton gave up \$26,550 in order to win out at the polls.

County Attorney Cole had no opposition for election and expensed with his assessment of \$50 in the republican county committee.

Miss Mary E. Foster, democratic candidate for the office of county superintendent, paid out \$88.50 for expenses during the campaign for that office. Her successful opponent, Miss Marquardt, has not as yet filed her statement.

In order to have the honor of filling the office of coroner, Dr. J. P. Brendel, the democratic candidate, expended \$85, while his opponent, B. I. Clement, was out only \$5.

In the race for county judge the candidates were let off easy, as Judge Beeson paid out only \$8, while C. L. Graves, his opponent, paid out the sum of \$14.22.
