FORMER PLATTSMOUTH GIRL GOES TO THE MECHANICS' INSTITUTE, ROCHESTER, N. Y.

Miss Pauline Davis, the daughter of Mrs. Kate W. Davis at 345 North Twenty-eighth street, will depart tomorrow morning for Rochester, N. Y., where she will teach cookery in the Mechanics' institute. She has the distinction of receiving the appointment over twenty-five other applicants. Miss Davis was formerly a student at the University of Nebraska, later completing her work at the Teachers' college at Columbia university in New York City. Following her graduation at the eastern school she taught cookery in the Stanley McCormick school at Burnsville, N. C. Mrs. Cyrus McCormick of Chicago, who endowed the school in memory of her son, chose her own teachers. Since the first of September Miss Davis has been assisting in the agricultural extension department of the university. The Mechanics' Institute in Rochester is a vocational school which is partly endowed by the Eastman Kodak company.—State Journal.
