JURY RENDERS VERDICT IN FAVOR OF MRS. GARRISON

REMEMBER WEDNESDAY NIGHT "A MODERN EVE" AT THE PARMELE THEATRE

CLARENCE E. ROBINE, FORMER PLATTSMOUTH CITIZEN COMMITS SUICIDE

Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock, in Omaha, Clarence E. Robine, a former Plattsmouth resident for a number of years, ended his earthly career by taking a dose of carbolic acid, from which he died a short time later while being taken to the hospital for treatment for the poison. Mr. Robine was some 45 years of age and was born and reared in this city, where the family resided for a great many years, but as far as known Clarence and a brother named Herbert were the last of this family to be left, the others having passed away. The whereabouts of the other brother, Herbert, are not known either here or in Omaha, where Clarence had been making his home at 2554 Cuming street. Mr. Robine was a painter by trade and was quite successful in this, but his solitude evidently weighed upon his mind and he made the final step that leads to the end. The inquest will be held in Omaha this morning by Coroner Crosby and the body brought here for burial in the family lot in Oak Hill cemetery, where the other members of the family are reposing in their final rest. Mr. Robine was unmarried at the time of his death.
