CLAMAGE'S BIG MUSICAL COMEDY OPENS THURSDAY

Clean-Cut, Snappy, and Everlastingly Something to Make the Audience Smile With Delight.

"Smile awhile, and while you smile, another smiles. And soon there's miles and miles of smiles; And life's worth while, because you smile."

The above is Mr. Arthur Clamage's favorite bit of verse, and he makes evident his belief in the wholesome philosophy contained therein by the class of musical comedy with which he has been identified of late years.

In all of his splendid musical comedies which will be seen at the Parmele theater for a three days' engagement, there is scarcely a white when the audience does not smile. In his new, frisky, tuneful musical comedies it is claimed that this clever comedian is gaining a still firmer grasp upon his admirers and those who believe in the "Clamage" idea of clean-cut, snappy, everlastingly something doing kind of musical comedy.

Few of this serious, work-a-day world care to go to the theater to study some abstruse problem or have their hearts bowed down by the foreboding fate of some unlucky heroine; but the acuating desire of theatrical devotees is to laugh, and laugh they will at all of the Clamage brand of productions. There is action every minute and then some, and the musical numbers are numerous and tuneful, the clever principals and the beautifully-gowned chorus join hand-in-hand to make these productions the best there is in musical comedy.
