THE OFFICE OF CORONER RELEGATED TO THE PAST BY THE LEGISLATURE

From the dispatches appearing in the morning papers the office of county coroner appears to have been relegated to the past by the legislature, as the measure has passed both the senate and house and now awaits the signature of Governor Morehead to become a law. The measure transfers to the county attorney the duties of the office in the different counties of the state. In this county the office of coroner has never been a very lucrative one, as it is a fee office and very few cases occur that necessitate the holding of inquests. The office is held at present by Dr. J. F. Brendel of Murray, who was elected last November to the position. In the larger counties of Douglas and Lancaster the office has been worth several thousand dollars a year in fees.

NEW BANK INCORPORATED AT LOUISVILLE TO OPEN NEXT MONDAY

Yesterday a new bank was incorporated in the office of County Clerk Libershal, which will be known as the Farmers' State Bank of Louisville. The capital stock of the new corporation will be \$20,000, and the annual meeting of the bank will be held each year on the third Wednesday in January. The incorporators of the bank are J. H. Arends, Fritz Nickles and H. L. Arends, and the directors, to act until the other officers are selected are H. L. Arends, C. E. Wood, W. E. Stander, John Group and Fritz Nicklas. The new bank will open for business on March

15th, at Louisville, and will make the second bank in that city, as the Bank of Commerce has been doing business there for some years past. Mr. Arends is a former resident of Syracuse, Neb., and the leading figure in the new bank.
