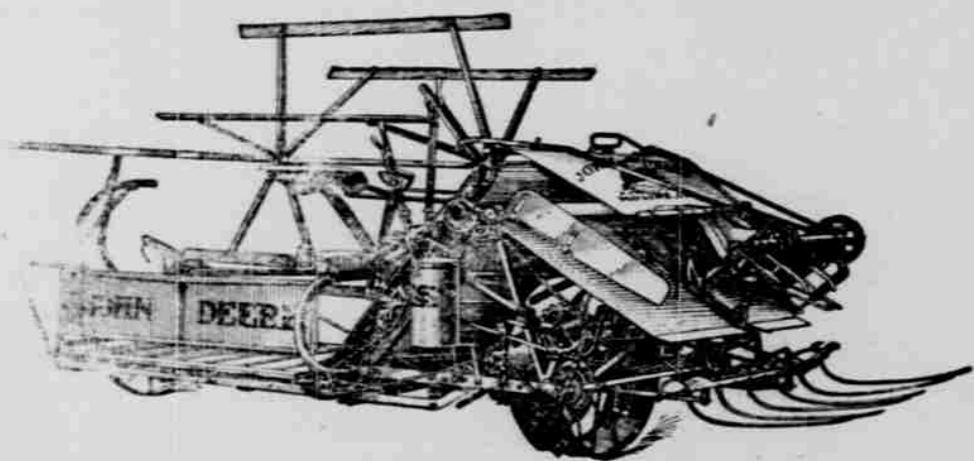

WHEAT PROSPECTS GOOD

Reported Excellent by Members of Legislature at Home.

Lincoln, May 20.—Reports asked for by Labor Commissioner Coffey from different counties of the state to ascertain the crop conditions are beginning to come in. Members of the legislature send them in, as follows:
Hall county, small grain conditions are about the same as last year.

From Beemer, in Cuming county, wheat is reported as 10 per cent better than last year, with plenty of help for harvest work.

From Amherst, in Buffalo county, the wheat acreage is reported 10 per cent greater than last year, with 50 per cent better prospects. The eastern part of Buffalo will need some harvest help.

From Gothenburg, in Dawson county, wheat prospects are said to be 50 per cent better than last year and there will be use for a large number of harvest hands.

From Valparaiso, in Saunders county, the wheat prospects reported are about like last year. A few extra harvest hands will be needed.

From Geneva, Fillmore county, the wheat crop, it is said, will run about five bushels to the acre better than it did in 1914 and there will have to be some outside help to gather in the crop.

HUMPHREY IN LEAD FOR COMMANDER

Veterans Urge Move to Get National Encampment at Omaha.

Minden, Neb., May 20.—A million-dollar rain did not dampen the ardor of the 700 delegates and visitors who are attending the thirty-ninth annual encampment of the department of Nebraska, Grand Army of the Republic. Delegates passed resolutions calling on Omaha to make an effort to secure the national encampment.

For department commander, George C. Humphrey of Lyon post, No. 11, Grand Island, is making an energetic fight.

Four towns are in the field for the next encampment, Hastings, Lexington, York and Aurora.

One of the features of the encampment is the interest and enthusiasm shown by the Grand Army for the Sons of Veterans, and resolutions have been presented looking for a much closer amalgamation of the two orders.

BOARD OF HEALTH MEETS

Dr. Case is Appointed Secretary to Succeed Dr. Wilson.

Lincoln, May 20.—The state board of health, composed of Governor Morehead, Attorney General Reed and State Superintendent Thomas, decided to dispense with the services of Dr. W. H. Wilson, secretary of the board for the last seven years. Dr. J. D. Case of Dorchester was appointed in his place.

The State Association of Medical men, according to custom, recommended three physicians for the place, the board to select one of the three. The men recommended were Dr. W. H. Wilson, the present incumbent; Dr. E. N. Leake and Dr. Case. The new appointee is an allopath.

The board passed a resolution calling for the enforcement of the law of 1913 relative to the abolition of the public drinking cup. The resolution calls for the thorough washing of glasses at soda fountains after their use by a customer. Institutions which do not strictly live up to the law will be prosecuted.

ANNEXATION INTO COURT

Suit to Enjoin Holding of Election to Vote on Merger.

Omaha, May 20.—The threatened attack by South Omaha and Dundee interests on annexation was started in the district court. It took the form of an injunction suit against the election commissioner, to prevent the holding of the election called by Governor Morehead for June 1, at which the voters are to pass upon the annexation, as provided by the law passed by the last legislature.

W. L. Seiby of Dundee is the ostensible plaintiff. Advocates of annexation asserted that South Omaha officeholders are in reality the persons responsible for the bringing of the suit. Alleged unconstitutionality of the annexation law and of the law passed in 1913, creating the office of election commissioner, is the basis of the suit.

Italy Soon In Market For Horses.

Grand Island, Neb., May 20.—Information received by horse buyers and agents of several governments here indicated that Italy will be a heavy buyer. Orders are said to have been received for tested and inspected animals for such consignment. In the meantime the recent reported order of 80,000 mules to be bought throughout the central west, assembled here and consigned to European points, is apparently being filled, as shipments are made just as soon as a carload or several carloads are on hand.

Child Dies From Her Burns.

Minden, Neb., May 20.—L. H. Christensen's two-year-old daughter accidentally tipped some boiling hot water over herself and died from her injuries.

GOVERNOR NAMES MAY 31 HOLIDAY

Bids Public to Observe Day Following Memorial Sunday.

FORMAL PROCLAMATION ISSUED

Banker Adams Appeals From Court Judgment—Stockmen to Attend Sanitary Board Meet—State Will Bring Suit to Enforce Tax Payments.

Lincoln, May 20.—Governor Morehead designated Monday, May 31, to be observed as Memorial day, as May 30 is Sunday. The proclamation is as follows:

"No day in the year has been more generally observed than Decoration and Memorial day. This year May 29 falls on Sunday, and by reason thereof Monday, the 31st, will be the legal holiday. Some localities intend to observe Sunday, the 30th, for religious exercise and for Decoration day services.

"It seems more fitting this year than ever that the day be universally observed. The flowers that fall on the graves of our deceased soldiers and friends will seem like a baptism of peace on the soil of our native land. And our national songs should breathe with a fervency of spirit, going out in anthems of praise to Almighty God for the conditions of peace and good will that prevail in the hearts of our countrymen. Our flag means more to us than ever before. It floats, untroubled, in the breeze and really speaks to the world, saying, 'My peace give I unto you.' The eyes of all appear to be resting on our banner. Let it be the rallying point to which the vexed and fretted kingdoms of the world may come and find peace."

School Land Assessments.

The state board of educational lands and funds met in the office of Land Commissioner Beckman and decided to use the same rules as has been used in the last year in assessing school lands. Regarding the increased appraisement of several tracts of land in Cedar county, where the county board had raised the appraisement from \$13,687 to \$88,107, and where Land Commissioner Beckman had investigated the matter and reported in favor of a cut of 25 per cent on the appraisement of the county board, the state board adopted the report of the land commissioner.

Hall to Have Aeroplanes Repaired.

Adjutant General Hall has ordered the Fremont signal corps to forward their aeroplane to Lincoln in order that the machine may be thoroughly overhauled and put in trim for aviation work. He has secured the services of Aviator Shaffer of Alvo, who formerly was a student of Lincoln Beachy, to look over the machine. Mr. Shaffer has a machine of his own, which is up-to-date in every particular, which he has placed at the service of the Nebraska guard and the Fremont machine will be equipped likewise.

Adams Appeals From Court Judgment.

C. E. Adams, former president of the defunct First National bank of Superior, which failed a year ago, has filed an appeal in the supreme court against a judgment secured in the district court of Adams county by W. A. Cole, receiver of the bank, for \$17,652.70, alleged to be due the bank from Mr. Adams as its president, needed to square up the accounts of the bank, which failed through the unlawful manipulations of the cashier.

Orchard Company Selects Its Officers.

The Loess Land company, an organization of the leading orchardists of the state, held its first annual meeting in Lincoln. The reports of its officers showed the purchase of a number of tracts of eastern Nebraska land for commercial orchards. Officers elected are: Peter Youngers, president; G. A. Marshall, vice president; W. H. Mellor, secretary; A. M. Shober, secretary, and Val Keyser, general manager.

To Force Tax Payments.

Two remittances from counties to the state treasurer were received, among others, which assists considerably in the cause of keeping up the payment of warrants. Folk county sent in a draft for \$12,137, and Cedar county sent in another for \$17,700. Thirty counties have not reported among them being Douglas. Attorney General Reed is preparing to begin suit against all delinquent counties which do not report shortly.

Stockmen to Attend Meet.

The state live stock sanitary board has selected E. Z. Russell of Benson, A. E. Graft of Bancroft and John Dalton of Lincoln as a committee to attend a meeting of live stock sanitary boards, comprising nine western states, which will meet in Kansas City soon to consider sanitary regulations in the west. The meeting was to have been held Thursday, but has been postponed to some future date.

Wants 2-Cent Phone Calls For Chicago

Chicago, May 20.—Two-cent telephone calls are sought by Chicago's Socialist alderman, as a result of proceedings to forfeit to the city the automatic telephone system.

Rain Checks Hessian Fly.

Kansas City, May 20.—A heavy, general rain in Kansas has checked the ravages of the Hessian fly and cinch bugs.

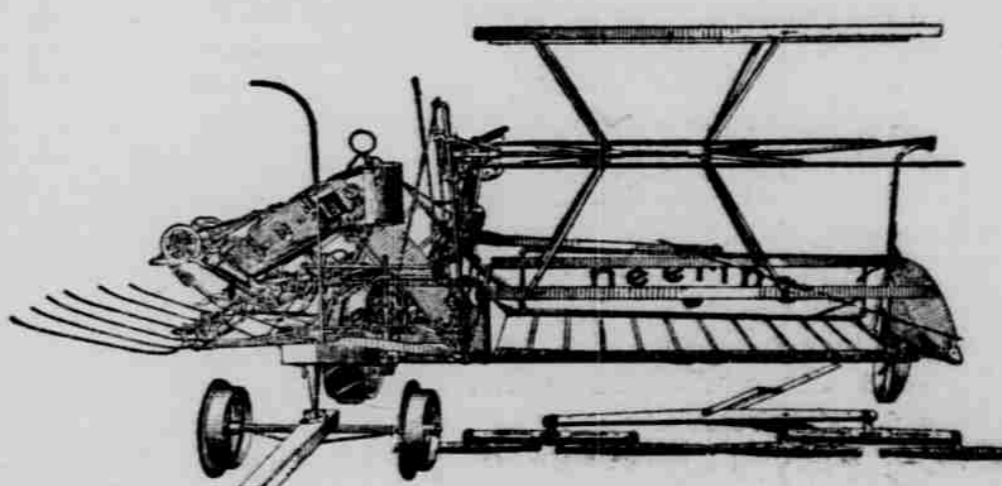
