Omaha, June 17.-Omaha is shortly to become the chief station of the weather bureau service. For many years Fort Weather, Virginia, a short distance out from Washington, has besa the point from which the important data relative to weather and metecrological information has been sent

Some months ago it was decided to abandon the station at Fort Weether and in easting about for a location for a new station the agricultural depart ment officials, after getting the views of experts, decided upon a point in Douglas county as the one offering for observing the weather of the United States.

The weather department took a lone time lease on forty acres of the Drexel east of Elkhorn, and at once commonced the installation of the equip ment for carrying on observations on
