MRS. EVA KATHRINA PRETTIG DIES AT HOME OF HER DAUGHTER

Last evening shortly after 9 o'clock Mrs. Eva Kathrina Prettig passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John P. Sattler, in this city, where she had made her home for the past twenty-five years. Mrs. Prettig was 79 years of age, and in spite of her years had been enjoying good health up to a few days ago, when she was so unfortunate as to fall and injure her head, and since that time has been growing steadily worse, as her age made it impossible for her to rally from the shock, and she peacefully passed away last evening, bringing to a close a long and useful life filled with good deeds and assistance to her friends and neighbors with whom she had been united in the ties of friendship for the past thirty years.

Eva Kathrina Mayer was born June 21, 1836, at Waldorf, Baden, Germany, and made her home in that section until she had reached the age of 19 years, when she came to America and settled at Pekin, Illinois, and was married in that city to Mr. Adam Prettig. After several years' residence in Pekin Mr. and Mrs. Prettig came west to Plattsmouth, in 1886, and here the husband was called away some twenty-five years ago and since that time Mrs. Prettig has made her home for the greater part of the time with her daughter, Mrs. Sattler and family. To mourn her loss she leaves three daughters, Mrs. Charles Herold, Pekin, Illinois; Mrs. John P. Sattler and Mrs. John Lutz of this city, as well as one brother, Carl Mayer, of Chicago, and a great many grandchildren.

The funeral of Mrs. Prettig will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the St. Paul's Evangelical church in this city, and the interment had in the Oak Hill cemetery.
