THE STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL DAY SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 7

Governor Morehead has issued a proclamation setting aside November 7 as a day to be observed throughout the state as "Come to Sunday School Day." The Nebraska State Sunday School association is inaugurating a campaign to get 500,000 people to attend Sunday school on that day, as follows:

It has come to my knowledge that certain societies who have for their object, among other things, the special study of the bible, and have indicated a particular day for the purpose of studying those portions that would tend to promote harmony among people and nations. I have been requested to give emphasis to the movement as chief executive of the state, the day to be known as "Nebraska get-together Sunday School Day." Believing that nothing other than good could come of a conscientious study of the bible on the general topic of peace, and to subserve the best interests of all, I cheerfully endorse the proposition in setting apart Sunday, November 7, 1915, as the day when a state-wide Sunday school be held for the purposes indicated, and commend it to the attention of all churches, and people generally. Given under my hand and seal of state this 4th day of September, 1915. JOHN H. MOREHEAD, Governor.
