FULLY TWO THOUSAND PEOPLE FROM HERE ATTEND PARADE

Last evening the electric parade of the Ak-Sar-Ben carnival in Omaha was the point of interest that drew thousands of the residents of Nebraska to the metropolis to witness the parade and the formal entry of King Ak-Sar-Ben XXI into the chief city of his realm. From the time of the first Burlington train at 8:15 yesterday morning the stream of sightseers from this city increased in numbers until the special train over the Burlington at 7 o'clock last evening, when eight coaches loaded with sightseers departed to take in the sights in Omaha, and the crowd on the special filled it to the aisles and steps of the train, and coming back it was necessary to put on two extra coaches to assist in caring for the crowd. The Missouri Pacific also did a big business at the 4:15 p. m. passenger train for the carnival visitors, and returning at midnight cared for a number of the crowd. It is safe to state that fully 2,000 of the residents of this city were at the metropolis to take in the big show, which while a very beautiful sight, was about the same as in past years.
