### FROM PERU NORMAL.

The second semester sees a number of changes of a permanent character in the program. The chapel hour which has heretofore, except during summer schools, been at 8:40, will hereafter come at 11:35. Each science subject is scheduled for a double period which is supposed to take care of both the class work and the laboratory work in that line.

President Hayes has received word from Washington, D. C., that Peru may soon expect a visit from Mr. Harold W. Foght, national specialist in rural school practice. He will hold conferences with school board officials, county superintendents, and rural school teachers with a view to more efficient rural school administration in southeastern Nebraska. The date of his arrival will be announced later.

Registration for the second semester began Friday. By Saturday evening all seniors had been registered. Some changes in the plan of registering have greatly facilitated matters. Printed programs have been placed in the hands of the students, and the registration of the different classes is being handled for the first time by permanent committees of the faculty. The remaining classes will be registered next Friday and Saturday. The second semester opens January 24.

A fifty cent registration fee is required of each Normal student to be used for the support of a school nurse. Faculty members advantage of this plan must pay fifty cents at the beginning of the semester. The Shaw cottage has been secured by the state board for the hospital and occupancy of the nurse. A permanent committee has been appointed to have charge of the finances and management of the health hall. The committee consists of Miss Rose Clarke, chairman; Prof. Beck, secretary-treasurer; Dean Mattie Cook Ellis, and Miss Frances Tut-hill, all of the faculty; Joshua Adee, of the post graduate class, and Miss Telva Dressler of the senior class.
