HOW HOGS CAN BE MADE PROFITABLE

Department of Agriculture Issues Bulletin on the Marketing of Swine.

THEY SUGGEST GOOD FOODS

Washington, D. C., Feb. 4.—How the raiser of hogs can make the best of a poor market is the subject of a bulletin issued by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The low prices received for hogs during the past year have been discouraging, the department admits. The hog should be a paying animal. He requires less labor, less equipment, less capital, makes greater gains on 100 pounds of concentrates...

Best Weight to Sell. Dr. Houston thinks that the best can be made of a poor market by having the hogs ready at the time when that market wants them most. Usually this is in September and October. And that market wants the hog between 175 and 225 pounds, which is the most economical point at which the farmer can dispose of his hogs...
