LIVE STOCK PRICES AT SOUTH OMAHA

Deef Trade Active and Strong to 10c Higher.

HOGS STEADY TO 10C OFF.

Lamb Values Just About Steady—Similar Deal in Ewe Trade—Ewes \$7.55—High Mark For Lambs is \$10.80.

Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Neb., Feb. 24.—Cattle receipts continue liberal, about 6,500 head arriving yesterday, making around 21,500 head for the three days. The fat cattle trade was very active yesterday and prices were strong to a big dime higher than Tuesday. Prices yesterday were right around a quarter higher than they were towards the close of last week, and there has been an advance of fully half a dollar as compared with the low time ten days or two weeks ago, the improvement being more on the common to fair grades than on the choice heaves, as the former meet with more competition from the feeder buyers. There was the same scramble for cows and heifers that characterized Tuesday's market and a good share of the offerings sold at prices that were about a dime higher. Country demand for stock cattle and feeding steers is keeping up well, and there has been a strong upward trend to values and the market is fully a quarter higher than last week.

Cattle quotations: Good to choice heaves, \$8.00@8.50; fair to good heaves, \$7.70@8.00; common to fair heaves, \$7.00@7.60; good to choice heifers, \$6.50@7.25; good to choice cows, \$6.25@6.75; fair to good cows, \$5.50@6.25; canners and cutters, \$4.25@5.25; veal calves, \$7.00@9.75; bulls, stags, etc., \$5.00@6.50; good to choice stockers, \$7.40@7.85; good to choice feeders, \$7.00@7.55; common to fair feeders, \$6.00@7.00; stock heifers, \$6.25@7.25; stock cows, \$5.25@6.50; stock calves, \$4.50@8.00.
Hog receipts were large yesterday, some 21,000 head arriving. Shippers bought their hogs at prices about steady, tops again reaching \$8.25 but packers were bearish and finally made their purchases at 5@10c lower prices. Bulk sold at \$7.95@8.10.
Sheep and lamb receipts amounted to 6,500 head. While the market was a little slow, prices on lambs were just about steady with Tuesday. Bulk of the decent to good lambs again sold at \$10.50@10.75, and others reached \$10.80. There was a good outlet for aged stock and prices looked fully steady. Real good Mexican ewes brought \$7.55.
