Dies at the Soldier's Home.

Mrs. Clara Campbell died at the Soldier's Home at Grand Island on March 15th, after an illness of a few months, at the advanced age of 81 years, death occurring on her eighty-first birthday. She was laid to rest beside her husband, who died last fall at Blair, Neb., their home for the past thirty years. The deceased is survived by one daughter and one son, both of whom are residents of Blair. Miss Clara Young was married to Matthias Campbell in Denver, Colo., in 1865, and for many years thereafter made Cass county their home, and in 1879 they resided on the farm that is known as the Oscar Capen place, then belonging to Little Frank Young. At a later date they moved westward and afterward located at Blair. There were fourteen children born to this family, the Charles Young family, and from the date of the first born child up to the death of the last of the family of fourteen, which was Mrs. Campbell, their lives will extend over a period of 104 years. Mrs. Young was the last member of the family but was neither the oldest nor the youngest. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell have been making their home at the Soldier's Home in Grand Island for some time, where both deaths occurred.

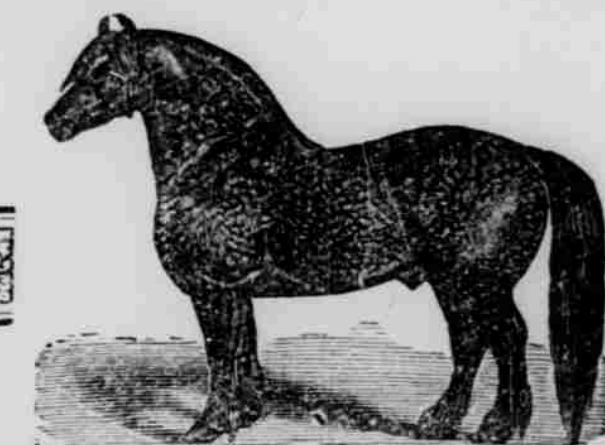
