In the matter of the location of a public road 40 feet in width, running across the northeast quarter (N E 1/4) of section twenty-two (22) in township ten (10) north, range thirteen (13) east of the sixth principal meridian, parallel and adjacent to and on the north side of the right of way of the Missouri Pacific Railroad company, where said right of way crosses said land: The County Clerk being satisfied that all the requirements of the law had been complied with, respectfully referred the matter to the Board of Commissioners for their consideration. The board proceeded to vote, and did vote, that the above road be established, all voting "for" the establishment of a road 40 feet in width and to be known as Road No. 375 and that claim for damages be allowed on the basis as fixed by the Board of Appraisers and surveyor be instructed to lay out road as required by law.

The Board of Commissioners adopted a resolution instructing the Clerk to have sample ballots printed on red or green paper and distributed as in former years.
