Union Stock Yards, South Omaha, Neb., May 4th, 1916.—Receipts of cattle were moderate, but 170 loads, or about 4,200 head being on Wednesday market.

GERMAN REPLY TO BE TO THE POINT IN TERMS

No Room For Doubt When Answer Finally Comes, the Press Is Informed.

Draft Finished But Still Subject to Changes; Delivery Date Is Not Known.

Berlin, May 4.—(Wireless to the Associated Press Via Sayville, L. I.)—The draft of the German reply to the American note has been finished.

The attitude of Germany will be stated in clear and precise terms. The note will leave no room for doubt concerning the exact position assumed by Germany, which will communicate the definite nature of instructions that will be given to submarine commanders and other data on which Washington itself can judge the situation.

The Associated Press is permitted to make these statements, although the censorship on dispatches tending to reveal the tenor of the German reply is still effective.

News to Washington. Washington, May 4.—The announcement from Berlin that new and definite instructions are to be given the German submarine commanders, is the first positive indication of how Germany will attempt to meet President Wilson's final demand that she declare and effect an abandonment of the present methods of submarine warfare.

Whether the new instructions will meet the terms of the last American note and thus prevent a break in diplomatic relations can only be determined by a close and a careful examination.

President Wilson is represented by those closest to him as unshaken in his determination that the issue is not negotiable; that a settlement cannot be delayed by discussion of side issues such as the British blockade and retaliatory measures; that the controversy between the countries can proceed further in diplomacy only if

Germany effectually stops destruction of ships without warning and takes measures to bring her submarine operations otherwise within the confines of international law.

With a declaration that such orders have been given and evidence that they will be carried out in good faith, the president is willing to discuss the conduct of submarine warfare, but only upon that basis.

The news that new instructions to submarine commanders will be announced served to encourage hope of a favorable outcome of the long dispute, but all comment is being reserved until the newest German communication can be thoroughly considered.

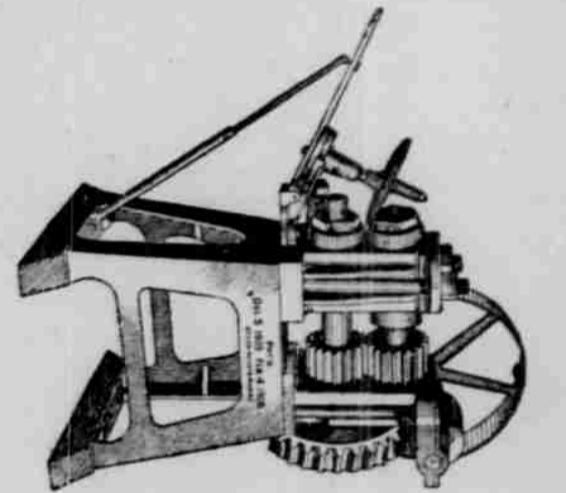

FIVE ZEPPELINS RAID COAST OF ENGLAND

No Damage is Reported, However—German and Russian Aviators Also Active in the East.

London, May 4.—Five German aviators Tuesday night attacked the northeast coast of England and the southeast coast of Scotland. The official announcement said a few large bombs were dropped in Yorkshire, but gave no details regarding damage.

A German attack against the Belgians north of Dixmude was the only infantry engagement reported on the western front. Only artillery activity occurred on this front.

An attempted German offensive against the Russians at Riga failed. German aviators bombarded the Russian positions on the Gulf of Riga, and Russian aircraft attacked the German naval base at Windau Courland.
