

"Whereas, The Nebraska Children Home Society of Omaha, Nebraska, has taken and cared for several children from Cass county, and saved the county the expense of caring for them;

"Therefore Be It Resolved, That the said society be allowed the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for furthering their work, and the county clerk is hereby instructed to draw a warrant for said amount.
