The Schuyler National bank has received permission of the state banking board to change from a national to a state bank under the name of the Schuyler State bank. The capital of the institution is reduced from \$50,000 to \$35,000.

Arthur Brandeis' will was filed in the Douglas county court. It fixes the value of the personal property at \$1,000,000, with \$100,000 real estate in Douglas county and \$100,000 outside. The will conveys all of the property to his son, J. L. Ervise Brandeis.

The Nebraska State League of Local Loan and Building associations, at its meeting in Auburn, changed its name to the Nebraska League of Savings and Loan associations. E. F. Snavely of Lincoln was elected president. The 1917 meeting will be held at Hastings.

Alexander J. Dunlap, who was recently graduated from the law department of the state university, has been chosen superintendent of the schools of Central City for the coming year. Mr. Dunlap has been a successful superintendent at Cambridge and Stromsburg in previous years.

PROMISES OF LOOT KEYS UP THE MEXICANS

The Reports Say Officers Are Assuring Them of Food at El Paso.

THEY ARE NOW MOVING NORTH

El Paso, Tex., June 28.—The hope of looting El Paso buoyed the half-starved and poorly clothed peons of Carranza's northern army today. Reports from interior Mexico declare the Chihuahua soldiers of the de facto government have been told by officers that just as soon as they reach El Paso they will have plenty of food.

Four prominent American mining men arrived in El Paso from Parral, after narrowly escaping being mobbed at Santa Rosalia and again at Chihuahua. Anti-American demonstrations were held in both towns as the American train was passing through. They reported heavy Mexican troop movements northward, estimating that 10,000 Carranza soldiers were en route to Chihuahua from southern points. This would bring the total strength of the de facto government's armies in the state to over 55,000 men.

Bell Plans Counter Move.

Plans have been made by the American force in El Paso for spoiling the reported looting party. General George Bell, jr., commanding 3,300 troops at Fort Bliss, is known to have prepared in the event of war, plans for crossing the Rio Grande, seizing the two Mexicans lines which terminate in Juarez and moving on to Villa Ahumada and Chihuahua.

Concentration of Carranza troops opposite Naco, Ariz., continued to be a source of apprehension to army officers today. The Mexican forces are said to number 6,000. A Carranza army of ten times that size is reported stationed at Cananea, ninety-seven miles south of Naco.

GREEK SITUATION IS VERY CRITICAL

Athens, June 28.—(Via London).—The situation in Greece remains critical and full of uncertainty, although the demands of the allies are being rapidly carried out. The royal decree for the general demobilization of the Greek army was signed by King Constantine yesterday afternoon and a Venizelos adherent, Seybrakakis, will be sworn in as chief of police today.

Rear Admiral Damianos has been appointed minister of marine. Vice Admiral Coudrotis, who was first named, refused the appointment.
