When a train comes at that moment, as happens not infrequently, the trainmen are suddenly confronted with an auto or team on the track with no chance to avoid hitting it. Result-deaths, injuries, sorrow, vain regrets. Are you paying the way

The railroads recognize their responsibilities and are every year improving as many crossings as possible. What is your responsibility?

Responsibility lies upon every driver of auto or team to know the way is safe. Yet 3,894 persons were killed the class membership from 1896 to would look out for them. Many had passengers in their car. Do you protect your passengers?

The above is a reproduction taken from a card circulated by the Burlington Route in their Safety First Campaign. These cards are being tacked up in conspicious places in garages and every other establishment where they are liable to catch the eye of the motorist.

Look and listen at the railroad crossings, and if in doubt about the way being safe stop and investigate. That is the safe way to do it. Do you do it that way?

With the ever increasing number of automobiles in use, it is necessary to adopt stringent measures to pro tect the lives of the general public.

The railroads over the country ar giving much time and attention t this problem but are helpless unless the co-operation of the motorist is forthcoming.

The driver of an automobile should read the above carefully; adopt the suggestions made therein, he will be doing his full share toward saving practically four thousand lives during the year.

DEATH OF MRS. HENRY SPECK AFTER WEEKS OF SEVERE SUFFERING

After weeks of the most painful suffering and during which time she had borne her suffering with fortitude and strength, Mrs. Henry Speck died Saturday evening at a hospital at Co lumbus. Neb. Of a kind and loving nature and filled with love and care for her family and home, Mrs. Speck's death comes as a very bitter blow to the husband and children as well as the bereaved parents and friends in this city. Throughout the long weeks of her care and doing what was possible to sooth her last hours.

The body of Mrs. Speck arrived in this city at 1:12 this afternoon, and was taken at once to the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kuhney.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the M. E. church and the body laid to rest in Oak Hill cemetery.
