**THE BONDS REDUCED ONE-HALF AND THE BOYS OUT**

Yesterday afternoon Edward, William and Jesse Bashus and Harvey Burke were released from jail where they had been committed following the preliminary hearing in the county court, on an order from District Judge James T. Begley admitting them to bond in the sum of \$2,500 each and accepting Frank Bashus and wife as the security for the amount. The men were bound over by County Judge Beeson in the sum of \$5,000 each and the matter was at once taken up by Attorney R. W. Patrick with Judge Begley, on an application to reduce the amount of the bond and the court reduced the amount set by the county judge to \$2,500, and the amount of the property of Mr. Bashus was held sufficient by the district judge.
