The U. S. Government has gathered reliable figures as to the value per acre of Farm Land in every state in the Union.

The Government takes the value of all the lands in a state, the high-priced land and the low-priced land, and then strikes an average.

On Page 36 of the "Monthly Crop Report" for April, 1916, published by authority of the Secretary of Agriculture, is found a comparison of the average value per acre of land with improvements, as follows:

NEBRASKA—Average value per acre, \$76

KANSAS—Average value per acre, \$58

The U. S. Government states officially that the average value per acre of land with improvements is \$18.00 per acre less in Kansas than in Nebraska. On a quarter section this amounts to \$2,880.00.

The soil of Kansas in every way is equal to that of Nebraska. Climatic conditions are the same.

50 AEROPLANES FALL IN FIGHTING OF ENEMIES

Germans Report the Great Battle on Somme Front is Again in Full Swing.

RUSSIAN AND GERMANS CLASH

British Advance on Struma Line, Occupy Tenmita and Pursue Enemy.

Berlin, Sept. 24.—(By Wireless to Sayville.)—The great battle on the Somme front, in France, says today's official statement is again in full swing. Anglo-French attacks last night near Courcellette, Rancourt and Bouchavesnes are said to have failed. In numerous air battles, the statement adds, German pilots shot down twenty-four entente aeroplanes, the Germans losing six.

British Advance.

London, Sept. 24 (2:47 p. m.)—"South of the Ancre Brook," says the official statement today, "there was considerable military activity on both sides. East of Neuville St. Vaast, the enemy trenches were entered and prisoners taken."

Germans Repulsed.

Paris, Sept. 24.—German troops this morning attacked French positions on the farm of L'Abbe Wood, north of the Somme, but were repulsed, says the official statement, issued this afternoon. In aerial encounters, twenty-six German machines were forced to descend, the statement adds, many of them being destroyed.

Teutons Taken Prisoner.

Petrograd, Sept. 23.—Russian and Austro-Germans are engaged in stubborn battles at various places on the front, from the Pripet marshes to the Rumanian frontier, according to the official statement today. Fifteen hundred Austro-Germans were taken prisoner in the fighting yesterday on the upper Zereth river.

Strong Russian Attacks.

Berlin, Sept. 24 (By Wireless to Sayville).—Strong Russian forces made repeated attacks yesterday on Austro-German positions north of Zboroff, in Galicia, says the official statement today. Russians penetrated German lines near Manaov, but were driven out by a counter-attack, leaving more than 700 prisoners.

Advance on Struma.

London, Sept. 24.—A British official communication from Saloniki, issued tonight, says:

"On the Struma front, having crossed the river at three places, our troops occupied Jenumita, driving the Kara Dzkovbala, where they met with strong opposition. Our artillery entirely dispersed a counter-attack from Navel-Jen.

"East of Nemhori, naval and field artillery successfully bombarded enemy trenches. "On the Dorian front our patrols have shown great activity, but most has hindered the artillery work."
