VILLA BANDITS GET \$50,000.00

Mining Company Agent Robbed—Sharpshooters Chase Automobile.

El Paso, Nov. 7.—Sixty-seven bars of silver belonging to an American mining company at Parral, Chihuahua, are reported to have been taken from Edgar Koch, an agent of the company, by Villa bandits at Santa Rosalia on October 27. The silver was said to have been valued at \$50,000 and was being brought from Parral to the border. Koch is said to be the German consular agent at Parral.

Officers of the mining company here say they have had no confirmation of the reported robbery. Nothing further has been heard from the Americans who were in Parral when Villa bandits are said to have taken the town.

Chased by Bandits.

Tucson, Ariz., Nov. 7.—Arthur Williams, agent for an automobile supply house in Chihuahua, reached here yesterday in a battered automobile after a chase with Villa bandit sharpshooters in another car, in the course of which a woman whose name is unknown here and Williams' little daughter were killed. Williams' wife was killed in Chihuahua before the chase.
