Harry Wells, county clerk, running or re-election, was easily defeated by George Sutherland, the democratic

Frank Peterson, democratic candilate for county attorney, ran away from George Hager, who was running for re-election.

W. H. Gardner, county superintenlent, regarded as an absolute cinch, fell before the democratic onslaught, and was defeated by Mrs. Minnie Prey Knotts, the democratic candi-

J. S. Baer, the republican candidate for clerk of the district court, and William Albers, republican candidate for county treasurer, were the only ones who weathered the storm.




