THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Plattsmouth, Neb., Jan. 9, 1917.
Board met in regular session. Present, Henry Sneke, Julius A. Pitz and C. E. Heebner, county commissioners; Frank J. Libershal, county clerk.

Minutes of previous sessions read and approved, when the following business was transacted in regular form:

Upon application the following banks were designated as county depositories by the board:

- The Bank of Murdock, Murdock, Neb.
- The First Security bank of Cedar Creek, Neb.

The county judge filed his report of fees for the fourth quarter, 1916, to the amount of \$903.20.

County Clerk Frank J. Libershal filed his appointment of M. A. Jirousek as deputy in his office at a salary of \$1,000 per annum, to be paid out of the fees of the office, and same was approved by the board.

Mike Tritsch, county treasurer, filed a request with the board asking to be permitted to retain W. K. Fox in his office for the month of January and same was granted by the board.

The county clerk was instructed to call for bids as follows: County printing; burial of palper poor, and for county physicians for the various physician districts. Bids to be received up until noon on Monday, February 5, 1917.

The following estimate of expense was made for the county for the year 1917:

For ordinary county revenue, to be used for general purposes, including the support of poor and poor farm of the county	57,000
For bridge purposes	38,500
For bridge purposes (emergency)	9,500
For road purposes	38,500
For soldiers' relief fund of the county	1,200
For mothers' pension fund of the county	4,000
Total estimate	\$148,700

As advertised, bids for the painting of the second floor of the court house and all of the outside woodwork were received from the following:

- G. A. Thompson Contracting Painters, Omaha, Neb.

F. R. Gobelman, Plattsmouth, Neb. The above bids were opened and all complied with the call of the county clerk as to the furnishing of a certified check, with the exception of the bid of G. A. Thompson Contracting Painters of Omaha.

On motion of Commissioner Pitz, seconded by Commissioner Heebner, the contract was awarded to F. R. Gobelman of Plattsmouth, he being the lowest responsible bidder. On motion the county attorney was instructed to prepare and draw up the necessary contract.

County Judge Allen J. Beeson filed his appointment of Marie Svoboda as clerk in his office at a salary of \$1,000 per year, payable according to law. Said appointment approved by the board.

- County treasurer this day instructed to refund to John R. Meisinger of Plattsmouth, Second ward, the sum of \$7.81, being the amount of city tax erroneously assessed against his personal property belonging in Plattsmouth precinct.
- Application, petition and license fee of \$20 for operating a pool and billiard hall in the village of Nehawka, Neb., received by the county clerk from Nels Anderson. On motion the board voted to grant said license, and the county clerk was instructed to issue said license for a period of one year, from January 12, 1917 to January 12, 1918.
- Contract made and entered into between Frank R. Gobelman and the Board of Commissioners of Cass county for the painting of the second floor of the court house and all of the outside wood work.

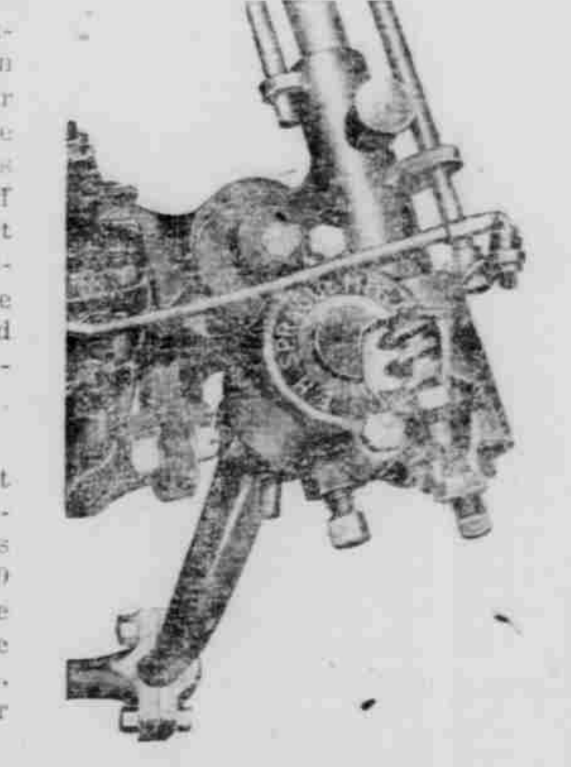
