Bad Accident.  
Johnny Carroll, son of Elisha Carroll, grandson of one of our oldest citizens, John Carroll, aged two years and five months, on Thursday last between 10 and 11 A. M. was wounded in the left knee by the discharge of a gun loaded with gooseshot, necessitating the amputation of the leg above the knee. It appears that his father, Elisha Carroll, had returned from goose shooting Wednesday night with a gun loaded. The kitchen being dark he placed the same under the bed on the floor in the bedroom; next morning on going to his work he forbid the children consisting of the wounded boy and his brother, leaving the house. His wife being sick lay down on the bed and fell asleep, and was awakened at the hours above, by the discharge of the gun and the screaming of the children. Springing from bed she discovered the oldest boy crawling from under the foot of the bed by the butt of the gun and the wounded boy lying on the floor near the head of the bed, his clothes on fire from the discharge; picking him up she found that he was deluged with blood, hastily wrapping him in cloths the father was sent for a wagon procured and the boy brought to town to Dr. Livingston's office where the limb was amputated by Dr. Livingston, assisted by Drs. Hall and Richmond.

At latest accounts the child was doing well and in a fair way to recovery.

**MORTON'S STORE WAS ROBBED AGAIN**

That robbers selected two of the best nights so far this winter was evidenced by them last Thursday and Saturday nights. Thursday night Morton's store was broken into by the breaking down of the rear door, and quite a quantity of meat and potatoes were taken. Nothing else was missed at the time. And again last Saturday night the same scoop was made on the same place. But this time everything that the robbers were able to carry with them, meat, potatoes, shoes, overalls and over \$16 in cash was taken.

This seems to be a regular annual picnic that is held about this time of the year between Mr. Morton and some of his unknown friends. From the looks of things it is the work of home talent for if it had not been local talent we are positive the spuds and the meat would have been overlooked.

As long as no one reports these criminal depredations to the proper authorities we can expect to have them continued, for why not? It is the duty of every storekeeper to make an earnest endeavor to capture those guilty of breaking and entering for the benefit of his brother merchants, who will have the same thing to contend with if it is not stopped. We realize that it is pretty hard to report the matter and have someone grabbed up by the law who is not guilty and is taken in through an error, but it would be far better to make some kind of a beginning than to let the matter go unheeded.—Union Ledger.

**GERMANS GAIN IN ACTIONS ON BOTH FRONTS**

Teutons Capture Five Hundred Men and Trench Lines on the French Line.

Berlin, Jan. 26.—Spirited fighting has taken place northwest of Verdun on the front in France, near Riga on the Russian front and southwest of Kut-El-Amara in the Mesopotamian theater.

German forces have been successful in the operations in the first two regions, while British troops have taken positions from the Turks along the Tigris in the latter.

Attacking in force on a front of 1,600 meters against Hill 304, northwest of Verdun, Teutonic soldiers stormed French trenches and took 500 prisoners. French troops, the latest French communique says, have recaptured most of the trench positions gained by the Germans.

Counter-attacks by the French failed, as did further attempts to regain the lost ground, according to Berlin.

German troops also gained ground on Dead Man's Hill and Avocourt. The fighting around Hill 304, Paris states, was in the nature of hand-to-hand combat at times.

West of Riga, in the Tirul swamp region along the river Aa, the Germans and Russians continue at grips in heavy fighting. German attacks, Berlin says, were successful and additional ground and 500 prisoners were taken.

Counter-attacks by Russian troops were repulsed in both sectors of the battle front, with heavy losses to the

attackers along the Aa.

Petrograd announces that the Russians, after advancing more than a mile in the battle zone, were forced to return to their position under the pressure of the attacking Germans.

Turkish first line trenches on a front of 1,100 yards were gained by the British in their attacks southwest of Kut-El-Amara. In addition, London says, some second line positions on the right bank of the Tigris were taken. West of the Hai river four counter attacks by Turkish troops were repulsed with heavy losses.

There has been no great activity in Rumania. On the northern portion of the French front British troops have carried out several successful raids.

The attack on the English coast near Loewestoft, reported by London, was carried out by German light sea forces. The German ships, Berlin says, were able to approach the English coast and to return to their base without sighting a hostile vessel. One small vessel, London records officially, fired shells at the coast. Only a few shells reached land and there were no casualties. The damage is reported as insignificant.

Action at Riga.  
Berlin, Jan. 25.—(By Wireless to Sayville, Jan. 26.)—"Russian attacks to the southwest of Riga," writes the military critic of the Overseas News Agency, "were quickly answered by a powerful German counter attack. On the morning of January 23 the bad weather having come to an end, German troops after short but efficient artillery preparation advanced on both sides of the river Aa along a front of six miles.

"On the evening of January 23 territory on both sides of the river Aa for a distance of nearly two miles was conquered. During the night of January 24 more ground was gained on the right wing to the east of the river.

"The Russian position situated near the eastern end of the German attacking lines, which had been surrounded on the evening of January 23, was cleaned out, about 400 prisoners being taken. According to declarations made by prisoners, the commander of this detachment received an order to withdraw. He refused, however, to heed the instructions and declared to the soldiers that he would maintain himself. When the Russians saw they were encircled by the Germans, they shot down the commander.

"By noon on January 24 Russian prisoners to the number of 1,100, including ten officers, had been brought in. The Germans also took thirteen machine guns."

**AUTO GOES THROUGH ICE MISSOURIANS TAKE BATH**

Auburn, Neb., Jan. 24.—While crossing the Missouri river about 1 o'clock yesterday morning, en route to their home at Phelps City, Mo., from a dance they had attended at Brawnville, Neb., Albert Kimberling and his sister, Miss Emma, narrowly escaped drowning when the automobile in which they were riding plunged into an airhole near the Nebraska side and not far from Brownville.

In the car with the Kimberlings and in the rear seat were Mr. and Mrs. Gould Smith and the Misses Allie Adams and Helen Mayes.

The Kimberlings and their friends with two other cars of people from across the river, had attended the dance and were going home when, as the lead car reached the opposite bank the occupants, Rex Shamy, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hale, Herman Lefenberg and Miss Hazel Adams faced a land crash, followed by screams, and the car was turned at once, with the light thrown across the ice, disclosing the fact that one of the cars had all but disappeared in the river.

Both cars were rushed to the point where the other had gone through the ice, and assistance given the people imprisoned inside, who were taken out over the windshield, the top being up and side curtains in place. The water was shallow where the car went down, the wheels resting on the bottom of the river.

Rescued from the submerged car, the half-drowned and nearly frozen people were taken across the river to the home of Dick Harms, where they were given dry clothes and stimulants, and it is thought will experience no ill effect of their early morning plunge in the frigid water.

Yesterday forenoon a force of men with ropes got the car out and ashore.
