The second rumor, via Switzerland and Paris, stated that the German emperor planned to be "the first promotor of universal peace and would propose that all parties meet forthwith to discuss this first and principal article of the war's terminationthe reorganization of future peace."

Holland reports indicate that a reply to President Wilson's speech is being considered in Berlin. A pronunciamento from the emperor would be a logical answer.

The German government expects President Wilson to transmit to Berentente powers to his own peace suggestions. Officially Germany is not yet informed of what the allies said in reply to the American president.
