### PERSHING IS ORDERED OUT BY BAKER

Officials Expect Entire Column Will Be Moving By Tomorrow. Trip to Border Will Require One Week.

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 28.—American troops of Major General Pershing punitive expedition tramped along the high road leading from Coloni Duhlan to the border today, on the first leg of the march which took them into Mexico in the pursuit of Francisco Villa.

Infantry cavalry, artillery and motor trucks moved along the tree-lined highway which winds across the plateau overlooking the Casas Grandes valley, like the old prairie schooners of the days of '49 moved across the plains of the sunset trail. Tonight the troops were encamped along the road with the head of the column resting near Hirsch's Hole, twenty miles north of the Mormon colony where General Pershing has made his field headquarters since the expedition ceased its pursuit of Villa and his band of followers, arrivals at the border said:

The last reveille at the field headquarters was blown before dawn today, and, by sunrise, the advance guard of the expeditionary forces was well on the way toward the border, according to Americans who came from the front late today on truck trains to Columbus, N. M.

General Pershing and his staff were expected to be among the last to leave the field headquarters and will ride to the first night's encampment in automobiles with the rear guard, these arrivals said. The long march to the Mexico-American border will be resumed tomorrow, it was said.

The Associated Press was the first to inform General Pershing of the formal order for the withdrawal of his column today and he immediately made a change in his plans for the exodus, the soldiers reported tonight upon their arrival here. Instead of establishing a field base at Ojo Federico, forty miles from the border as was originally planned, there to await the formal order for withdrawal, General Pershing was said to have arranged to establish his temporary field headquarters at Las Palomas lakes, seven miles south of the border where he would hold a general review of them before they made the last lap of the march into Columbus. The actual crossing of the border would not occur, it was predicted tonight, until next week.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 27.—Withdrawal of the American military expedition in Mexico was ordered by the war department today, and by the end of another week the entire command, after ten months on Mexican soil, probably will have recrossed into the United States.

The order went to General Funston in command at the border and left to his discretion the exact time of starting the northward movement and the details of carrying it out.

For several weeks he has known of the administration's determination to order the troops back to the border and under his direction the expedition has been concentrated for the long march.

Officials here understand that some advance units already have started north, and believe that within forty-eight hours the whole column will be in motion.

#### SUNDAY AN IDEAL DAY.

#### STAMPED ENVELOPES ADVANCE.

The high cost of paper and inks has caused Uncle Sam to advance the price of stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers, according to notification sent out to the postmasters throughout the country. The No. 5 2-cent envelope will now cost \$21.70 instead of \$21; the No. 5 1-cent envelopes will now cost \$11.60 per thousand instead of \$11, as formerly; the No. 8 2-cent envelopes will now cost \$22.56 instead of \$21.56, and the No. 13 envelopes will cost \$21.74 instead of \$20.08 as they have in the past. The price of newspaper wrappers will be \$10.96 per thousand instead of \$10.72. The price of envelopes in the small sales will not be affected by the increase, but those who purchase them in large quantities will feel the increase somewhat.

### REPUBLICANS ARE UNITED ON ALL PARTY POLICIES

Washington, Jan. 28.—Republican members of the house of representatives will caucus probably Friday night on the legislative situation. There will be a general sizing up of the political discussion of house organizations and legislative policies for the coming congress.

A resolution to be considered among others is one introduced by Representative Anderson (Minnesota) left over from last week's republican caucus, to create a committee of fifteen republicans to receive and consider suggestions as to a legislative program for the republicans in the next house. This is regarded as a compromise for Representative Gardner's progressive program.

### BUSINESS IN JUDGE ARCHER'S COURT TODAY

### EMPOWERED CARRANZA ON CALL CONGRESS

Election to Be Held Last Sunday in February; Elect President in March.

Assembly Approves Act for Religious Freedom; Ministers Mexican Born.

Queretaro, Mexico, Jan. 28.—The constitutional assembly has adopted an article whereby General Carranza is authorized to issue a call and provide regulations for the election of members of congress, to be held the last Sunday in February. Congress will meet in extraordinary session on April 15. Congress also will act as a sort of electoral college, passing on the presidential election and officially declaring the president elected. No mention is made as to the date of holding the presidential election, but it probably will be the last Sunday in March. The extraordinary session of congress will take under consideration certain laws and will appoint judges and other officials who will assume office July 1, when the present officials end their terms. The term of the next president shall be considered as beginning December, 1916, so the next election will be held in December, 1920.

The article providing that candidates for state office or congress must have resigned from the army ninety days before the election has been amended to permit the candidacy of army men provided the locality where they are seeking office is outside the place where they held their military command. The assembly approved the article which provided that everyone would be free to follow his religious desires and practice the ceremonies of his denomination in the church or at home, but that every public religious act must be celebrated in the church, which must always be under the vigilance of the authorities. It was decided also that ministers of all sects must be Mexicans by birth, and the legislatures of the respective states were authorized to determine the maximum number of each sect in each locality, according to the necessities, considering them members of a profession and subject to the laws governing professions.

Felix M. Palavacini, former secretary of public instruction, made a vigorous speech in which he said that President Wilson was the greatest ruler of today, that he had understood the situation in Mexico from the beginning of the revolution and that Mexico would not have had any difficulties with the United States except for the deplorable influence of certain individuals. Secretary Lansing, he said, wanted to settle matters by alcohol formulas without regard to the ideals of popular sentiment.

### GERMAN FRONT IS SMASHED BY RUSSIANS

Petrograd Announces Teuton Line Pierced for Distance of Two Miles, Prisoners and Loot Taken.

Berlin, Jan. 28.—(By Wireless to Sayville.)—On account of superior Russian pressure directed against the Teuton lines in the Meste Canave sector on the Golden Bystritsa river front in Romania, says today's German official statement, the Austro-German forces yesterday were compelled to withdraw to positions near the east bank of the river.

Russian attacks against the Germans on both sides of the River Ar, in the Riga sector, were repulsed with heavy losses to the forces of Emperor Nicholas.

Petrograd (Via London), Jan. 28.—(British Admiralty Per Wireless.)—Russian forces after artillery preparation assumed the offensive yesterday against the Austro-German fortified positions on both sides of the Kimpolung-Jacobeni road, near the northwestern frontier of Moldavia, and after stubborn fighting broke through the Teutonic lines, along a front of nearly two miles, says the Russian official statement today.

Prisoners and booty were taken by the Russians, the extent of which has not yet been ascertained. Southwest of Riga three successive German attacks were repulsed by the Russians.

The statement follows: "After fierce artillery preparation the Germans launched an attack against our detachments occupying positions on both sides of the Kalzemb-Chilok road, to the west of Riga. The attack was repulsed and the enemy fled in disorder. Two hours later the Germans launched another attack on the same front being again repulsed. After artillery preparation the enemy assumed the offensive against our troops occupying positions six versts northwest of the village of Kalzemb, but the attack was arrested by our fire.

"During the night of January 27, after artillery preparation, small enemy detachments attacked our posts on the River Shara, in the region of the Baranovichi-Luninetz railway line, but were driven back to their trenches.

"A German airplane dropped bombs on the station at Zamdre on the Alexandrovskia railway.
