Plattsmouth, Neb., Feb. 8, 1917. Board met pursuant to adjournment, with all members present, when the following business was transacted in regular form:
In the matter of petitions for establishing a public road, commencing at the Southwest corner of the NE quarter Sec. 8 T 12 R 12 running thence North and terminating at the Northwest corner of the SW quarter, Sec. 5, T 12, R 12, and the vacation of a public road commencing at Cedar Creek running thence South and Southeast to point where it intersects with the public road running between the NW quarter and SW quarter of Sec. 8, T 12, R 12, filed with the County Clerk December 18, 1916. The County Clerk reported to the Board that as required by law he had appointed a disinterested party as viewer to examine said roads and report on said petitions, and that said viewer had filled the office and returned his reports on both petitions. The viewer reported unfavorably on petitions for establishing of new road and vacating of old road. Said reports together with viewers recommendations were read to the Board. The Board instructed the clerk to refund the road deposit to the parties paying same.
Plans and specifications and bidding blanks, for bridges, arches and culverts a prepared by the State Engineer were adopted by the Board, and County Clerk instructed to call for bids for building wood, steel, and wood and steel bridges, concrete arch and box culverts and other concrete work, such as wings and abutments for the year 1917 as provided by law. Plans and specifications now on file in the office of the County Clerk at Plattsmouth, Nebraska.
Separate bids may be filed for each class of bridge work and for concrete arch and box culvert work.
All bids to be filed on or before noon of Saturday, March 17, 1917, and all bids to be opened at 10 o'clock A. M., on Tuesday, March 20, 1917.
The Board of County Commissioners reserve the right to build all bridges and concrete culverts costing \$500.00 or less.
The Board of Commissioners reserve the right to reject any or all bids, and in letting contract reserve the right to let same in whole or in part.
A certified check for \$500.00 must accompany each bid.
There being no further business the Board on motion adjourned to meet Tuesday, March 6, 1917.
