BILL WOULD REGULATE COUNTY CLERKS PAY

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 25.—One salary raise bill now before the legislature seeks to elevate salaries which have not been touched in twenty years, and makes it impossible for the increase to be gained by the officials until its equivalent shall have been earned in fees of the office.

This bill, then becomes the fairest and most unique salary bill that has been before the legislature in two decades. It affects a portion of the clerks of the district court, a part of that class of officials who have not been benefitted by increases through many years past, and in the face of the fact that practically all other classes of county officers have been raised in that time.

The present law makes no graduated scale of pay for clerks in counties of from 16,000 to 25,000 population. The intention of the pending bill is to provide for this in a new scale which runs as follows: Under 16,000 population, \$1,600 a year; between 16,000 and 18,000, \$1,800 a year; between 18,000 and 20,000, \$2,000 a year; between 20,000 and 25,000, \$2,500 a year, and in counties of greater size than that the salaries shall be the same as now provided by law.

The present salaries are sufficient for clerks in the larger counties of the state, friends of the measure say but in the counties affected by the amendment, the salaries are wholly inadequate. Because the bill is apparently based on strict needs and does not contemplate a wholesale increase, and affects no officers raised in recent years, there is hope here that the bill will be put through without any considerable amount of opposition.

PLANNING BIG AUTO CARAVAN.

Saturday Miss Margaret Ellen Brown (state secretary of the Nebraska State Sunday School association and W. H. Kimberley, business manager of the Association, were in the city for a few minutes enroute by automobile to the state line in order to inspect the Omaha-Kansas City auto route with a view of conducting an automobile caravan from this section of the state to Omaha in June on the occasion of the state Sunday school convention. It is expected that there will be 2,000 cars from southeastern Nebraska in the caravan and it is expected that the route selected will be over the Omaha-Kansas City route. The road is reported as excellent with the exception of the portion from this city to the bridge over the Platte river.

THE FUNERAL OF GRANDMA HEEBNER

Pioneer Lady Laid to Rest on Last Friday. She Had Lived to a Ripe Old Age.

The funeral of Grandma Heebner was held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the home of her step-son, John Heebner, five miles southeast of town, where she had made her home, and was very largely attended by relatives, neighbors and friends who were desirous of paying their last respects to the grand old lady who had lived among them so many years. The funeral services were in charge of Rev. W. M. Ellidge, pastor of the Congregational church. The remains were laid to rest by the side of her husband in the German cemetery northwest of Nehawka.

Among the relatives attending the funeral were grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Friends from a distance were Mr. and Mrs. Henry Koop of Bertrand and Mrs. Herman Kiplin of Walton.

Obituary.
Margaretha Pafol was born at Byern, Germany, July 18, 1837, died February 14th, 1917, aged 79 years, 6 months and 26 days.

At the age of 28 years she was married to Mr. John Wonderlich at Byern, Germany. To this union three children were born, one of which survives, Mr. John Wonderlich of Nehawka.

In 1870 her husband was killed in a railroad accident in Germany, as also was the fate of her second husband, Mr. Henry Heebner, who was fatally injured on a railroad bridge near Nehawka.

She was married to Mr. Heebner in 1879 in Germany and became the step-mother of five children, three of whom came to America with them in 1880. Mr. Fred Heebner of Nehawka, Mrs. Louise Lehman of Weeping Water and Mr. John Heebner of Weeping Water, with whom she made her home since the death of her husband in 1901. The deceased was confirmed in the German Lutheran church at an early age and had kept faith through all the years.

Grandma Heebner as she was known to one and all, was a member of the Helping Hand Aid society of Sunny Hill, in which vicinity she had lived since her arrival in this country, about 37 years ago. Aside from her home duties she was deeply interested in her friends and neighbors and in times of trouble and sorrow, to others, was already ready with a willing hand of service, and quick tears and words of sympathy.—Weeping Water Republican.

PETER GRUBER IS

THROWN FROM HORSE AND KILLED

The vicinity of Union was thrown into gloom Friday when Peter Gruber, one of the young farmers of that community was thrown from his horse and almost instantly killed while riding home from Union where he had been looking after some trading. The tragedy occurred on the highway about half-way between the town of Union and the home of Simon Gruber, father of the unfortunate young man and with whom he resided. The tragedy occurred late in the afternoon and no one was present when the unfortunate accident took place. The horse on which Mr. Gruber was riding evidently became restless and threw the young man to the roadway and then the animal fell and crushed Mr. Gruber in a terrible manner, causing almost instant death. The body was found by passers by and taken to the home of the parents where it remained until the funeral services Saturday. Mr. Gruber was thirty-three years of age and unmarried and had made his home with his parents assisting them in the conduct of the farm. The death has caused great regret in the locality where the unfortunate victim has long resided and his parents have the deepest sympathy of the entire community in their loss.

WASHINGTON FACES MOMENTOUS WEEK

Expect Reply From Austria Which May Bring New and Added Complications.

Washington, Feb. 25.—As this government today entered its fourth week of broken relations with Germany, there loomed immediately ahead one of the most critical periods in the nation's history.

President Wilson is expected to appear before a joint session of congress during the coming week and discuss

the general foreign situation and means of handling it after congress adjourns.

Austria is expected to reply to this government's virtual ultimatum on the submarine question.

The reply will bring to abrupt head or will serve to eliminate all danger of a break for the time being.

It appears unlikely tonight the president will be called upon to announce a break with Austria. In Austrian circles it is freely predicted that country will make such a reply as to make a rupture unlikely.

MESSAGE FROM JAPAN

Baltimore, Md., Feb. 25.—The Rev. C. S. Reifsnider, president of St. Paul's college, Tokio, Japan, in an address here today delivered a message which he said the Japanese vice minister of state had bidden him to give the American people:

"Japan," reads the message, "will never go to war with the United States unless the United States impunges Japanese honor."
By "honor," Dr. Reifsnider said, the minister had meant such things as the alien laws in California and restrictions on immigration.

"I did not consider the message as a threat," said Dr. Reifsnider. "It impressed me as the expression of a desire to placate the United States."
